## PROSPER PAUL DIES IN MISSOULA

WELL KNOWN RESIDENT OF FRENCHTOWN EXPIRES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS.

Prosper Paul, a well-known resident of Frenchtown, died at the Sister's hospital here Tuesday night, where he had been confined for two weeks with brain trouble. The death brings much grief to a wide circle of friends, as Mr. Paul had been a resident of this county for 35 years, spending most of his time at his home near Frenchtown.

Mr. Paul was born in St. Alme, Canada, 56 years ago, and during his residence in the Frenchtown valley he has always been one of the most respected citizens of that district. Besides his wife, Mr. Paul leaves in the immediate family to mourn his loss six sons, Alexander, Dorila, Felix, Henry, Arthur and Eugene Paul, and one daughter, Mariette Paul.

The funeral will be held at Frenchtown Friday morning.

## DEMOCRATIC TICKET ELECTS EIGHT

MAJORITY OF COUNTY OFFICES ARE TO BE FILLED BY MEN OF WILSON'S PARTY.

For clerk of the district court—Thomas P. Conlon, democrat; plurality, 782.

For county commissioner—John J. Flynn, democrat; plurality, 377.

For county clerk—W. J. Babington, democrat; plurality, 1,615.

For sheriff—William L. Kelley, democrat; plurality, 349.

For county treasurer—J. W. Hicklin, democrat; plurality, 661.

For county assessor—D. B. Currie, democrat; plurality, 831.

For county attorney—Dan J. Heyfron, democrat; plurality, 583.

For county auditor—T. G. Hatheway, Jr., republican; plurality, 158.

For county superintendent of schools—Mrs. Edna O. Reinhard, republican; plurality, 256.

For county coroner—Charles H. Marsh, republican; plurality, 48.

For public administrator—E. L. P. Ester, democrat; plurality, 158.

For county surveyor—James H. Bonner, republican; plurality, 413.

In the election of Tuesday the county officials named above were elected. A majority of the successful candidates are democrats. The republicans elected three candidates and the democrats eight. The greatest plurality of any successful candidate was that of W. J. Babington, democrat, candidate for the office of county clerk. Mr. Babington's plurality was 1,615. He actually had a majority of 567 over three other candidates.

The smallest plurality was that of one of the republican winners, Charles H. Marsh, who defeated W. D. Kendrick for the office of coroner by the narrow margin of 48.

In the contest for township offices, Harry M. Small, democrat, and William Dyson, progressive, were chosen as justices of the peace. Mr. Dyson led with 1,208. Mr. Small's vote was 1,170. Sam Pulliam, republican, and Swan Johnson, democrat, were elected constables. Mr. Pulliam's vote was 1,076 and Mr. Johnson's 1,139.

Coroner Marsh yesterday received a message from the Odd Fellows' lodge at Ouray, Colo., stating that Fred Yates, the man who dropped dead in logging camp up the Blackfoot several days ago, had no known relatives. ## POLITICS HURTS NOT MR. WHITESIDE

CAMPAIGN HAS HAD NO EFFECT UPON POPULARITY OF "THE TYPHOON."

This is one of the national campaign years when the most astute of theatrical managers galled wrong," observed Charles P. Salsbury, business representative in advance of Walker Whiteside, last night. "Ordinarily, national campaigns have been fatal to show business since the parades and rallies have occupied the attention of people to an extent that traveling companies, however the compelling nature of their play, have suffered frightfully. But this season, whether it may be the wonderfully prosperous condition of the country, or the well-grounded belief that Wilson would win by a margin as wide as the latest returns indicate, has been the most prosperous for the really big attractions that has been known in many years. Mr. Whiteside, of course, has had the advantage of an especially appealing play. 'The Typhoon' is probably the most sensational success the stage has known in 20 years. The potency of its theme and the daring manner in which it has been handled by the author has probably caused more discussion than anything the stage has ever known. This may be the reason why this campaign has not affected Mr. Whiteside's business. But having traveled from New York to Missoula since August 25 I can truthfully state that no national election within my memory has caused less discussion in the smoking rooms of Pullman cars and in the lobbies of hotels than that just ended. It has occurred to me that the people of the United States so firmly believed that no one of the candidates for the presidency could or would do anything likely to disturb the unprecedented prosperity of the country that they simply voted as they thought right, and didn't talk about what they intended to do. Mr. Wilson's daughters will enjoy the splendid tennis court on the White House grounds, where the splash of the fountain will make music of cooling sort, and their vista will comprehend the magnificent Washington monument and the green hills of Virginia across the Potomac as they play. It is a fine home to which the Wilson family will go next March, and so far as I can figure, the good wishes of many millions of loyal Americans will go with them and wish them happy habitation."

Mr. Salsbury's acquaintance with Washington is rather intimate, since he acted as private secretary to General J. M. Rusk, secretary of agriculture, during the Harrison administration, and has since been connected with the editorial department of the Washington Post.
