

DR. AYLEN RESIGNS FROM HOSPITAL

DR. JENNINGS IS APPOINTED TO FILL PLACE MADE VACANT BY THE RESIGNATION.

Dr. J. P. Aylen, chief surgeon at the local Northern Pacific hospital, has resigned his position there and will engage in the practice of surgery either in Missoula or in Fargo, N. D. Dr. Aylen has been connected with the local hospital for several years and during his tenure of office he established an enviable reputation. Dr. Aylen's connection with the Northern Pacific will not be severed, as he will be consulting surgeon if he decides to remain in Missoula. He will be succeeded by Dr. Jennings, who has been assistant chief surgeon here for the past two years. Dr. Jennings was to have taken the position of chief surgeon in the company hospital at Glendive, but will fill the chief surgeon's place here instead. Dr. Beach, an interne of the company hospital at Glendive, Minn., will take the position at Glendive. Dr. Aylen said yesterday that he sent in his resignation about October 1 and that he would remain in charge until December 4.
