CROP REPORT HELPS WALL STREET

SPLENDID CONDITION OF THE CROPS AIDS STOCKS IN THEIR RECOVERIES.

New York, Nov. 8.—Stocks again were reactionary today, opening with a wide variety of losses, which were somewhat extended by midday, but making up much of their decline toward the end. A factor in the recovery was the government crop report, issued in the final hour. This fully confirms the brilliant outlook of the last few months, especially as to corn.

Prior to the issuance of the agricultural statement, almost all stocks of importance displayed varying degrees of heaviness. Foremost among

these were Louisville & Nashville, which yielded three points, while Harriman, the Canadian group, grangers, coalers and trunk lines were off one to two and one-half points.

The leading industrials also suffered from persistent selling. United States Steel declining over two and one-half points, with a similar loss for Amalgamated Copper and other metal issues.

Utah Copper, however, went higher on the excellent showing of the third quarter of the year.

Local money conditions were mildly disturbing, call loans being quoted at 5 1/2 to 6 per cent.

Bonds were irregular, with total sales, par value, \$2,125,000.

United States government bonds were unchanged.

MURDERER OF WIFE IS LYNCHED

NORTH DAKOTA MOB DEPUTIES AND TAKES PRISONER.

Steele, N. D., Nov. 8.—George Baker, in the Kildar county jail here, charged with the murder of his wife and his father-in-law, Thomas Glass, was taken from his cell today and lynched by a mob. It is the first lynching in North Dakota within a decade.

One week ago Baker returned from California, where he had been living, and whence his wife preceded him by about two weeks to Dawson, N. D. Entering the home of Mr. Glass he opened fire, killing both his wife and father-in-law. The shooting is said to have been the result of family trouble.

Baker was rushed here at once and every attempt made to protect him, but a mob of 50 men overpowered the sheriff and deputies, and taking Baker from the jail, hanged him within the city limits. No arrests have been made so far.
