The members wish to publicly thank the merchants and chicken fanciers of Missoula for the generous way in which they have contributed to wards the support of the coming show and wish to say that it is possible to promote these exhibitions, only through the co-operation and generosity of the friends of the association.

returned to owners in splendid shape and the association thereby gained a reputation for courtesy and promptness in dealing which has been an immense help to the present officers in promoting the coming show.

One of the most prominent judges in the country, George D. Holden of Minnesota, has been engaged to award the prizes. The fact that a man of his ability will do the judging will not only materially stimulate entries, but will be an assurance that the best bird will win. Two years ago we had the same judge and his fairness won him a host of friends who will be pleased to know that they will have a chance to again show their birds under him.

The premiums given this year will be the largest ever awarded in western Montana and the specialties the most valuable and numerous. The splendid array of silver loving cups, to be distributed amongst the winners in the various classes, will be an added inducement to the exhibitors.

The Northern Pacific Railroad company and the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound Railroad company have presented the association with two very handsome loving cups valued at \$50 each to be competed for at the forthcoming show. The one from the Northern Pacific being placed on the highest scoring solid colored exhibition pen and the Milwaukee cup being placed on the highest scoring parti-colored exhibition pen.

The competition for these two cups will bring together the highest class birds in Montana and the winners will undoubtedly be the sweepstakes claimants of the state for year 1912-13. The two beautiful cups offered by the Kohn Jewelry company and the Berg Jewelry company in competition, will also create keen competition. The former cup has been placed on the highest scoring solid colored bird; and the latter cup on the highest scoring parti-colored bird.

The First National bank, in an endeavor to bring out a large and interesting exhibit of utility fowls, has donated a beautiful loving cup, valued at \$25, to be awarded to the utility pen winning the sweepstakes shape special, all breeds competing. This class will develop into one of the hottest contests of the show and the winning pen will have to show very high quality before taking the blue.

It is the ambition of the prominent Single Comb White Leghorn breeders to make their class the largest one in the showroom and in furtherance of this object, Tyler B. Thompson, the most prominent and largest Single Comb White Leghorn breeder in the northwest, has given a handsome, attractive \$25 cup to be awarded to the highest scoring bird of the breed. The entries in this class will be very heavy with large strings from Hamilton, Stevensville, Helena, and Butte in line. The quality to be shown this year will compare favorably with that shown at the greatest shows in this country.

Another cup that will be eagerly fought for will be the one given by the association. This will be a large silver cup valued at \$40, which will be given to the exhibitor who has the greatest number of qualified birds on exhibition. The competition here will also be very hot and with the entries in the larger classes being very heavy and of high quality, the exhibit winning this prize will be worth going a long way to see.

The numerous specials offered by the Missoula merchants have been placed with a view to bringing out the greatest number of high-class birds, both utility and exhibition.

All classes will undoubtedly be very large. The cash specials are distributed very evenly throughout the list, the largest prizes being placed on the pens, which have over \$400 placed on them. This amount of prize money on pens, alone, should insure an exceptionally heavy entry and the indications are that there will be over 1,000 birds in line when Judge Holden begins his work. This means that Missoula will no longer have the second largest show in the state, as heretofore, but this year will forge to the front and present to the public the largest and finest exhibition of pure-bred poultry ever attempted in this state.
