

BADGERS DOWN GOPHERS, WHILE YALE TIES PRINCETON VARSITY, ENJOYING A HOLIDAY FROM REGULAR GAME, PICKS UP CRIPPLES

THE BULLDOG AND THE TIGER PLAY EACH OTHER TO A TIE

Pumpelly, Yale Back, Becomes Hero by Booting Ball for Field Goal from 50-Yard Line, Making Score Six-All, Just Before Time Is Called for Game's End.

Princeton, Nov. 16.—Princeton and Yale, in their annual football battle on University field today, played each other to a 6-to-6 tie. The teams were so evenly matched that neither had power to rush the ball to a touchdown. Each put up a stonewall defense and all the scoring was done on goals from the field and a goal from placement.

It was one of the most remarkable goals from the field ever seen on the Princeton gridiron.

Pumpelly dropped the ball and booted it on the rebound. Hardly anyone expected to see the ball soar to the goalposts.

As the ball cleared the bar, Referee Neil Snow of Michigan threw up his hands, indicating that a score had been made and the thousands of Yale rosters, reaching in from the sidelines had tied the score, sent up a tremendous cheer.

The Yale substitutes turned somersaults on the sidelines and Pumpelly was almost carried to his position by his fellow players.

For Princeton, the hero of the game was Hobart Baker, who made both of the black and orange field goals. Both were easy chances and came in the second period.

Flynn, the tall fullback of the Yale team, was the first man to make a score. In the first period he kicked a goal from placement within the 25-yard line.

Princeton surprised Yale by the aggressiveness of her attack and the strength of her defense.

In the first two periods, Princeton slightly outplayed Yale in all departments except kicking, in which Flynn had a decided advantage of DeWitt.

Outside of the stubbornness of the defense on each side and Pumpelly's great field goal, there was nothing remarkable about the game. The lineup:

The Game. Yale took the goal with wind at her back. H. Baker, Princeton, kicked off out of bounds, but the ball was put in play by Yale for a kickoff from the Yale 40-yard line. Baker gained five yards through the Yale tackle and an off-side play gave Princeton five more yards. Then S. Baker went through tackle for seven yards.

Phillips ploughed the Princeton center for five yards and on the next play Yale shot through the Tiger line to the Blue's 42-yard line. Spalding put the ball on the 45-yard line, giving a first down.

Spalding smashed through left tackle for four yards. Flynn here

punted to Princeton's five-yard line. H. Baker ran back 19 yards. DeWitt punted to Phillips on Princeton's 28-yard line. Phillips made three yards through center and Spalding two more. Markle here took Phillips's place.

Flynn kicked a placement goal from the 40-yard line, but failed. The ball was put on the 20-yard line and Princeton was about to try a line plunge, but the ball was interfered with by the Yale center. DeWitt punted to the Blue's 25-yard line. Spalding made two yards through the Tigers' left side and time was called again as Schenk was injured.

Princeton's defense stood up solidly against Spalding's assault on the next play and then Yale was penalized 15 yards for holding. Flynn punted to Princeton's 45-yard line. H. Baker taking the punt. DeWitt immediately punted back and the ball went out of bounds, the quarter ending with the ball in Yale's possession on Yale's own 25-yard line. Score: Princeton, 6; Yale, 3.

In the fourth quarter Pumpelly went in the game again, this time supplanting Markle. Flynn sent a high spiral punt which H. Baker gathered in and carried the ball back to Yale's 47-yard line before he was brought down. On a left wing shift DeWitt failed to gain. Princeton's fullback then punted to Wheeler on Yale's 25-yard line.

Spalding failed to gain and Flynn made a punt of 60 yards which
