

CANADIAN OFFICER IN MISSOULA

J. FORSYTH SMITH OF BUREAU OF AGRICULTURE INVESTIGATES CONDITIONS.

A visitor of note in Missoula yesterday was J. Forsyth Smith of the Bureau of Agriculture in Victoria, B. C. Mr. Smith is sent by his department to investigate general conditions affecting the fruit industry throughout the northwest. He comes to Missoula from Spokane, where he attended the national apple show. "I have heard many and interesting reports of your wonderful Bitter Root valley," said Mr. Smith yesterday. "and I am eager to see it. We use many of your McIntosh Reds and your Transcendental crabs for planting in our Okanagan valley. Conditions there are similar to those here, good in the present, but promising far greater results in the near future. We shipped about 1,800 cartons of apples and 120 cars of peaches from our valley this season, but that is only a beginning for coming seasons."

Mr. Smith will go up the Bitter Root valley today and study it, as he has studied the Wenatchee, the Yakima and the Hood River valleys, in respect to culture, packing and marketing of fruit.

RAILWAY MEN WILL BEGIN WORK SOON

UNIVERSITY EXTENSION LECTURES TO BE RESUMED AT THE NORTHERN PACIFIC.

Master Mechanic Draper of the Northern Pacific stated yesterday that the extension course given by the university each year would be resumed at the Northern Pacific within a short time. Last year the extension work of the university proved very popular among the employees of the Northern Pacific and several large and well-attended classes were conducted all year. "We expect to begin this work just as soon as we can get to it," said Master Mechanic Draper. "A number of the boys have been making inquiry concerning the courses and when they will start. We must make some arrangement with Supervisor Fleming so that we can use his office in which to hold the classes. I do not anticipate that we will have any trouble along this line and hope to get started on this work soon."

Probably the principal feature of the day at the Northern Pacific depot was the departure of Ticket Agent Malcolm Johnson and his bride on their honeymoon to the coast. The couple left on No. 3 and received a real sendoff. None of the old formulas for starting a bridal couple on its honeymoon was overlooked. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson will return in about a week.

The work of replacing the 70-foot turntable at the Northern Pacific with a 75-foot table will be commenced today. The new table is to be operated by electricity. The reason for the change is that it was necessary to have a longer table than the one in use at the present time. The turntable to be replaced is the one east of the roundhouse.

Conductor Wilburn of the Northern Pacific is lying off on account of the serious illness of his father.

Beginning the first of next week, the Northern Pacific will begin its heater service on freight trains. During the cold weather oil heaters are used in the cars containing perishable goods.

Fred Dodge, clerk in the superintendent's office at the Northern Pacific, has returned to work after a few days' layoff on account of sickness. Mr. Dodge is taking the fast cure and is trying to establish a record. He has eaten nothing but milk for the past 25 days.
