He struck the match down on the inside and the resultant explosion damaged the car considerably and also Mr. Bellows. If there had been any gasoline in the tank the car would have been destroyed. The explosion was caused by the gasoline vapor that remained in the tank. The fire department was called, but the blaze was out by the time it arrived. December 13 the law students of the University of Montana will hold a public mock trial of "The Jennie Brice Case." The Assembly hall of the university will be the court room. The characters in the case and all officers of the court will be represented by students of the law. Judge Duncan will likely consent to act as judge. "The Case of Jennie Brice" is a detective story running in the recent issues of Everybody's Magazine. December 20 Everybody's will give \$15.50 in cash rewards for a few of the best mock court trials of the case. "The Case of Jennie Brice" is by Mary Roberts Rinehart, who wrote those successful mystery tales, "The Amazing Adventure of Letitia Carberry," "The Man in Lower Ten," "When a Man Marries."

Following is a brief synopsis of the case. The scene is laid in Pittsburgh. Jennie Brice is an actress. One night she disappeared. Mrs. Pitman, the boarding-house keeper, felt sure that she had been murdered. In a letter received two days afterwards, Jennie Brice stated that she had merely gone away on a visit. Meanwhile the river was at full flood. People went from house to house in boats. A dog of the house brought in a water-soaked slipper of Jennie Brice's, and later a broken knife that had been in Mrs. Pitman's room the night before unbroken. When, in addition to these suspicious signs, Mrs. Pitman saw blood stains on the boat rope, she decided that Jennie Brice had been murdered. ## WESTERN CANADA'S PROSPERITY

Not a Boom, But Due to Natural Development.

One of the largest banks in Holland has been doing a big business in Western Canada, and Mr. W. Westernman, the president, on a recent visit into the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, expressed himself as being much impressed with present conditions and prospects, and was convinced that the great prosperity of the Dominion was not a boom, but merely the outcome of natural developments.

Not only has money been invested largely in Western Canada by the Holland banks, but by those of Germany, France as well as Great Britain. Not only are these countries contributing money, but they are also contributing people, hard headed industrious farmers, who are helping to produce the two hundred million bushels of wheat and the three hundred million bushels of the other small grains that the provinces of the west have harvested this season.

During the past fiscal year there came into Canada from the United States, 133,710; from Austria-Hungary, 21,651; from Belgium, 1,601; Holland, 1,077; France, 2,094; Germany, 4,664; Sweden, 2,394; Norway, 1,692. And from all countries the immigration to Canada in that year was 354,237. From the United States and foreign countries the figures will be increased during the present year.

Most of the people have gone to the farms, and it is no far look to the time when the prophecy will be fulfilled of half a billion bushel crop of wheat in Western Canada.—Adv.

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### STATE POWER PLANT NEEDS MORE MONEY

Helena, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—The legislature will be asked, in all likelihood, to appropriate \$80,000 for the completion of the state's hydro-electric power plant at Race Track, mid-way between Warm Springs and Deer Lodge, the power generated being used at the state prison, the state asylum, and the state tuberculosis hospital. The plant will generate 1,000 horsepower in low-water season, of which 200 horsepower will be used for state institutions, and the remainder sold at \$5 a horsepower, if the views of the state board of prison commissioners are carried out. Such a plant, it is said, will greatly reduce maintenance expenses.
