

MICHIGAN DEFEATS SUFFRAGE

FIGURES OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE INDICATE AMENDMENT FAILED TO PASS.

Detroit, Nov. 28.—The constitutional amendment providing woman suffrage in Michigan was defeated by 254 votes, according to figures compiled in the secretary of state's office at Lansing, from every county in Michigan. Until the result is officially announced by the state board of canvassers, December 10, it is said that no definite statement will be made by the advocates of the amendment, as to what course of action they will next take. Plans are now being made in many districts, however, to petition the legislature to resubmit the question in the spring election.

The only county definitely decided upon is in Saginaw county, where the figures showed a majority of about 2,500 against the amendment. There is a possibility that the county may swing the victory back to the woman suffrage advocates, who have been claiming it up to within the last two days.

PROFITS OF FEDERAL INCREASE

OUTPUT OF A WELL-KNOWN COEUR D'ALENE MINE MUCH LARGER THAN BEFORE.

Mullan, Nov. 28.—(Special).—During the month of October the Federal Mining & Smelting company made net profits of \$116,000, as against \$87,500 in September and \$69,000 in August. The increased net profits are due very largely to the improved savings being made at the milling plant of the Morning mine at Mullan and to the new ground secured in proximity to the Standard-Mammoth mines at Mace. The company recently purchased the Cleveland and Green Hill claims and the ore bodies in this new ground are being worked through the old Mammoth tunnel at Mace. Based on its October earnings the company's per cent on the preferred stock, or 7 per cent on the preferred and 8 per cent on the common. The company is now carrying on experiments at the Morning mill at Mullan on a new zinc flotation process, which if successful is expected to make even a better saving of the zinc values of the ore than the McQuisten process. The company now has a 200-ton plant of the McQuisten tubes in operation which has proven very successful, making a saving of from six to eight tons per day of zinc concentrates from a product which formerly went into the creek through the tailrace.

The old Tamarack & Chesapeake mine is to commence producing ore on a large scale within 20 days, according to plans of the management. A new milling plant is rapidly nearing completion and the underground workings are being placed in shape for mining the ore bodies already blocked out. The mine will be worked under a new company called the Tamarack & Custer Consolidated Mining company, in which the Day family of the



New Parcels Post Rates in Diagram



MAP SHOWING NEW PARCEL ZONE SYSTEM.

Although the new parcels post law goes into effect the 1st of January, comparatively few persons understand its provisions. Perhaps this accounts for Uncle Sam's recent activity in preparing a parcels post map and scattering copies of it broadcast over the country.

Uncle Sam's map is very much like the one shown above. Its most noticeable feature is the division of the country into zones.

Now, you have doubtless heard of the zone system in connection with the parcels post and wondered what it meant. A glance at the map will show you, though to completely understand it you may have to imagine yourself as living at the national capital.

The map shows clearly the relation of each zone to the city of Washington. Uncle Sam might have drawn a map showing the relation of each zone to the city of Kokomo and it would have been just as good for illustrative purposes.

The zone marked 1 on the map has a radius of 50 miles; zone 2 includes the area outside of zone 1 for a radius of 100 miles; zone 3 the area outside of zone 2 for a radius of 200 miles; zone 4 the area outside of the third zone for a radius of 400 miles; zone 5 the area outside the fourth zone for a radius of 1,000 miles; zone 6 the area outside the fifth zone for a radius of 1,400 miles; zone 7 the area outside the sixth zone for a radius of 1,800 miles; zone 8 all the area outside the seventh zone, including the Philippines.

The strike of ore made in the National mine at Mullan is proving of great importance. For more than a week now the lower haul has been in a good grade of copper ore. The shoot is now over 60 feet long and is getting stronger as the work nears the shaft which was put down on the ore from the surface. The width of the ore shoot is not known, as no attempt has been made to crosscut it, but that it is five or six feet wider than the drift has been proven by drill holes. Owing to a great quantity of water, much of the ore is in the form of a green carbonate of copper, with which is mixed considerable sulphide ore not yet reached by the waters of the vein. In the upper workings the mine showed a good shoot of high-grade galena ore, and it is expected that this will be found in good shape on the present lower level.

The Hypotheek Mining company has announced the levy of an assessment of five mills per share. The company recently developed a new body of silver-lead ore of commercial importance, and it is fully to open this ore body that the present assessment has been called.

and wanted to send a pound of candy to a friend in Fort Wayne, a glance at the map would show you that Fort Wayne is in the fourth zone. Referring to the table, you would note that the cost of sending the parcel to the fourth zone would be 8 cents.

If instead of sending the candy to Fort Wayne you wanted to send it to Erie, Pa., the cost of sending it would be only 7 cents, as Erie is in the third zone. The shorter the distance the parcel is to travel the smaller will be the expense of sending it.

And of course the weight of the package will have something to do with the expense of sending it also.

The new law establishes the following rates: That the rate of postage on fourth-class matter weighing not more than four ounces shall be 1 cent for each ounce or fraction of an ounce, and on such matter in excess of four ounces the weight shall be by the pound, as hereinafter provided, the postage in all cases to be prepaid by distinctive postage stamps affixed.

That except as provided in the next preceding paragraph postage on matter of the fourth class shall be prepaid at the following rates: On all matter mailed at the post-office from which a rural route starts, or delivered on such route, or mailed at any other point thereon, or at the office from which the route starts, or on any rural route starting therefrom, and on all matter mailed at a city carrier office, or at any point

within its delivery limits, for delivery by carriers from that office, or at any office for local delivery, 5 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 1 cent for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery within the first zone, except as provided in the next preceding paragraph, 5 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 2 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery in the second zone, 6 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 4 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery in the fourth zone, 8 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 6 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery within the fifth zone, 9 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 7 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery within the sixth zone, 10 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 8 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery within the seventh zone, 11 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 9 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery within the eighth zone and between the Philippine islands and any portion of the United States, including the District of Columbia and the several territories and possessions, 12 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 12 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

For delivery on such route, or mailed at any other point thereon, or at the office from which the route starts, or on any rural route starting therefrom, and on all matter mailed at a city carrier office, or at any point

within its delivery limits, for delivery by carriers from that office, or at any office for local delivery, 5 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 1 cent for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

IN FEDERAL RANKS REBELS ENLIST

MEXICAN INSURRECTOS ADOPT NOVEL METHOD FOR RECAPTURE OF JUAREZ.

El Paso, Nov. 28.—Juarez, the important border point, threatened by insurrecto attack, has found that rebels are enlisted among the town's defenders. A series of arrests were begun today which, it is said, will materially diminish the 500 federal soldiers of the local garrison. A half dozen men selected from the ranks were placed in jail, charged with not only being rebel sympathizers, but with actually being rebel soldiers. General Tracy Aubert, left with only a few federal regulars and no artillery, found it necessary to recruit his ranks to full strength. Rebels crossing from El Paso joined the federal army and today the Mexican secret service exposed a plot wherein the so-called volunteers were preparing to turn against the regulars when the insurrecto attack was made. The arrival from the state capital of some artillery is expected to assist materially in defending the town should an attack be made. It developed today that three trains supposedly of troops, which left Chihuahua City a few days ago for the north were merely work trains with a small troop escort. The federal government has refused to send reinforcements into the northern part of the state, where rebels appear as numerous as at the beginning of the revolution and where the federal garrisons admittedly are inadequate.

MOB IN LOUISIANA LYNCHES BLACKS

THREE NEGROES WHO ASSAULTED DEPUTY SHERIFF IN JAIL MEET DEATH.

Shreveport, Nov. 28.—Wood Burke, Jim Heard and Silas Jimmerson, three negroes who attacked and seriously wounded Deputy Sheriff Edwards of Bossier parish, several weeks ago, were taken from three deputies tonight and lynched. The deputies and their charges, traveling in buggies, were met at the edge of a swamp by a mob. The deputies were overpowered and the negroes taken into the swamp and hanged.

Burke, Heard and Jimmerson, prisoners in the Bossier parish jail, attacked Edwards on the evening of September 10, when the prisoners were being served supper. The negroes beat him into unconsciousness with a piece of pipe and escaped. His condition still is regarded as serious.
