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### Underworld in New Light

(New York Telegram.)  
If one may quote A. H. Woods himself, last evening's affair at the new Billings Forty-second Street Theater was "some opening." An opening indeed it was—an opening of a new theater, an opening of a new play and an opening of numerous bottles of fizzy fluid by the management and friends before and after the stage ceremonies.  
Last evening marked Mr. Woods' entry into the ranks of manager of first class theatres in the Broadway district and his best foot was forward in honor of the occasion. The little Billings, named after Mr. Woods' favorite star, is a gem of loveliness and comfort. The seating capacity is about 1,000, but every one of that number is able to witness the performance on the stage from a spacious seat and with unobstructed view. The decorations are both rich and in excellent taste, an Egyptian effect predominating in the friezes and ornamentation. The general color scheme is of gold, light blue and mauve, and the whole gives the atmosphere of brightness, gaiety and comfort. The mask of Drama, embossed in gilt, is conspicuous in the decorations, and the mural paintings are of a high order of excellence.  
Floral pieces in a profusion that congested Forty-second street traffic were in evidence, handshaking and congratulations were the general order of procedure in the lobby, and again the occasion may be summed up in Mr. Woods' own apt phrase of "some opening."  
**It Was a Success.**  
To make the night still more eventful, Bayard Veiller's play, "Within the Law," proved to be a huge success. It caught the fancy of the crowd from the outset, held the audience in tense interest throughout, won a flood of laughter by its comedy and finally swept along to sure victory.  
Whatever the evils of the present police situation and wrongdoing unveiled by the Rosenthal murder, the sponsors for "Within the Law" are fortunate in having the scandal develop at this time. A more timely play under the existing circumstances could not be imagined, for the story deals with police oppression, disclosed in its most brutal form.  
Cropping out from the main story is a reamant against a capitol that underpins its hirelings and forces them into dishonesty. Mr. Veiller has

profanity and filippine, cleverly delivered by Florence Nash as Agnes Lynch, an incorrigible crook, Vice is generally triumphant, but the vice is ingeniously cloaked in a manner to make it, if not attractive, at least entertaining.  
Mr. Veiller's ingenuity has not stopped there. A Maxim silencer plays an important part in a murder which is accomplished noiselessly, and the search-light of a neighboring skyscraper is cleverly introduced to reveal a dead body at a moment of great suspense. And once having won their audience, Mr. Veiller does not hesitate to go the entire distance of sentimentality and show Mary Turner at the final curtain happy in the arms of her dotting husband.  
Jane Crowl never has appeared to so great advantage as in the role of Mary. It was as much due to her skillful acting as to the author's ingenuity that the play became plausible and possible. Hers was a sure touch, one that revealed her as one of the most finished leading women on our stage. Whether in the plain frock of the shopgirl or the ultra-stylish gowns of Mary's more prosperous days, Miss Crowl acted the character of the avenging woman with a shading that was nearly flawless.  
Perhaps a role that will be more talked about is that of Agnes Lynch which fell to Miss Nash. To her were given the repartee, the slang and the gibberish with which we have become familiar in plays of this kind. Her retorts were always apt, sometimes luminously funny and occasionally coarse.  
William E. Mack gave a careful, studied, quiet portrayal of Garson, one of the crooks. Carme Caldera in the part of young Glider made a fine, mainly figure, and Dodson Mitchell acted convincingly the department store owner. Others in an all-round excellent cast were Catherine Tower, Brandon Hurst, John Willard and Wilton Taylor.  
"Within the Law" is a far better play than, for instance, "Alias Jimmy Valentine." Mr. Veiller has found something new in the underworld that will interest the rank and file.
