ATTORNEY GENERAL CRITICIZED

COUNSEL FOR SOUTHERN PACIFIC TAKES EXCEPTION TO WICKERSHAM'S STAND.

Washington, Jan. 3.-Criticism of the course of Attorney General Wickersham in the Southern Pacific litigation is made by Maxwell Everts and Henry W. Clark, counsel for the Southern Pacific railroad, in a brief filed today in the supreme court of the United States in defense of their claim to millions of dollars' worth of western oil lands. It is said that title to \$200,000,000 worth of oil lands depends upon the outcome of the litigation.

The case now before the supreme court involves questions as to whether Edmund Burke and other private litigants have better claims to the land than the railroad company. The government recently filed a suit seeking to annul patents to the land it issued to the Southern Pacific.

"It is unparalleled in the history of judicial procedure," declares the railroad's attorneys, "for the attorney general of the United States to be permitted to intervene as a friend of the court in a case between private litigants and then to use the privilege granted him as to attempt to have decided issues not now before the court, and which may or may not hereafter come before it, in a government suit just begun against one of the parties to the case at bar. It certainly is unjust to the railroad to be compelled in this court of last resort, not only to defend the present case, but also to defend another case arising on entirely different facts, which has not proceeded beyond the filing of a bill of complaint."

"Especially is this so when the great seriousness and vast importance of this matter not only to the Southern Pacific railroad, but to all land grant railroads, is considered."

The attorneys presented to the court an opinion Attorney General Wickersham is purported to have rendered the secretary of the interior in 1911, in which he expressed the belief that opinion in the case he is now supporting before the supreme court is sound.

The railroad attorneys take the position that the patents are conclusive evidence that the lands are not mineral, whatever they may have been discovered to be since the patents were issued.

A clause in the patents which excepted "mineral lands" from the grant is held by the railroad attorneys to have been absolutely void. The cases will come up for oral arguments January 6 or a few days later.

The government's brief has not been filed.
