## PRODUCTION OF OIL SHOWS A DECREASE

Washington, Jan. 5.—With the world's consumption of oil increasing 1,000,000 barrel a day, of which the United States supplies almost two-thirds, production of petroleum in this country in 1912 was 229,200,000 barrels less than 1911. While the production was less, the rising price of oil increased the total value of the product markedly. Last year the output was valued at \$150,000,000, an increase of about \$15,000,000 over 1911.

According to David T. Day of the United States geological survey, the eastern oil fields, as a rule, declined in production because it was impossible to keep up with the great output of 1911 without large additional discoveries of pools in the older fields. The eastern decline, however, was offset by the increase in California.

## IN TROUBLE

San Francisco, Jan. 5.—J. Cal Ewing, owner of the San Francisco Seals of the Coast league, is trying to escape from a very hot frying pan in which E. N. Walter, late president of the Oakland team of the same league, placed him on resigning recently.

For years there has been considerable gossip to the effect that Ewing had only owned the Seals, but that he was the principal owner as well of the Oakland club. Ewing constantly denied the rumor, and until quite recently Walter did also.

But friends felt out and in this way came confirmation of the rumor that Ewing was the actual owner of a big block of Oakland stock. Walter published it to the world.

Feeling became so strong in the two Coast league towns and fans demanded that Ewing dispose of his entire interest in one club or the other. He decided this was the best thing to do. So he has sold his stock to Secretary John B. Cook and President Frank W. Leavitt of the Oakland association.

"I am out of the Oakland baseball club," says Ewing, "and I sincerely hope that this old syndicate baseball talk will cease instantly. "My club is the San Francisco club. In fact, it always has been since the fire. The very fact that I held stock in the Oakland club did not lessen my interest in the Seals. I always worked to give San Francisco a winning team. I took a chance with the club after the fire, when all the others tossed it up. I directed its affairs and its policy, but I never had anything to do with Oakland. I defy anybody to say otherwise."
