

MAIL CARRIER DROWNED. Seattle, Jan. 9. The navy yard has received a dispatch from Tatoosh Island, Cape Flattery, saying that the mail carrier, Charles White, had been drowned. White, an aged Makah Indian, for many years had carried the mail between Neah Bay and Tatoosh in a canoe, making the journey alone. He was a famous canoeist, having been the subject of a number of magazine and newspaper articles.

PRICES ARE HIGHER FOR THE DAY

DEMAND FOR STOCKS IS LIMITED BUT GENERAL AVERAGE IS IMPROVED.

New York, Jan. 9.-Although the demand for stocks was still limited today and trading continued dull, prices were elevated in all departments and the last figures of the session showed gains of one to three points among the large number of issues.

The copper market showed a marked strength. The petroleum shares, the local traction issues and some of the independent steel stocks were prominent in the dealings, and rubber rose to 6 3/4, its highest price on record.

The expected announcement of new financing for Baltimore and Ohio was made today of its forthcoming issue of \$24,000,000 of convertible 4 1/2 per cent bonds, being the largest undertaking of the kind this year. The price of 4 1/2 per cent, at which these bonds are to be offered to stockholders, gave some indications of the terms on which the extensive new financing now contemplated may be accomplished.

Call loans again ruled under 3 per cent, and with money still flowing from the interior, there was every indication that the money market had settled down for a period of ease. Foreign exchange rates continued to rise, the market not being affected by the exportation of gold.

The bond market was steady. Total sales, par value, \$3,947,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Chicago, Jan. 9.-It was a hard day for shorts in the grain pits today. Corn shorts were fairly stamped and bid against each other in order to cover, running the price of May up for a net gain of 1 cent. A variety of influences advanced May wheat 5c, but shorts were the most active bidders, oats and provisions finished the day higher.

The advance in wheat was based on enthusiastic reports of export sales, exceeding 50,000 bushels from Chicago, and a good demand from millers, who were said to have sold 250,000 barrels of flour in the last two days to buyers alone. Shorts were the heaviest purchasers.

Traders short of oats covered in sympathy with the wheat and corn strength. Cash oats in the sample market advanced 3/4c. Demand for shipment was moderate.

There was a general demand for provisions because of the light run of hogs west and higher prices at the stock yards.
