MARKET PRESSURE RELAXES

UNDERTONE IN WALL STREET IS BETTER AND MANY ISSUES GAIN A LITTLE.

New York, Feb. 19.—Pressure on the stock market relaxed today and the downward movement was checked. The undertone was distinctly better, and at the close a number of leading issues had established net gains of one to two points.

Early in the day, after a strong opening, bear traders made a drive at the market and succeeded in sending some stocks to new low points for the movement. The list offered better resistance than recently, however, and prices soon moved up again. Thereafter the market was steady.

The change to some extent was a reflection of the improvement abroad, the principal foreign markets exhibiting a better tone. The chief source of strength lay in the size of the short interest. Covering of short contracts was responsible for a brisk demand for some of the speculative leaders. Steel was bought persistently, and there was a steady demand also for Reading and Union Pacific. The strength of these stocks influenced the remainder of the list. There was some further selling of minor stocks, but the declines were not severe and had little influence on the market as a whole.

Bonds were heavy. Total sales, par value, \$2,300,000.

Grain and Provisions.

Chicago, Feb. 19.—Showers and light snow as far east as the Missouri river this afternoon eased off the price of wheat. At the close the market ranked from 1/2 cent decline to a shade advance. Latest trading left corn 1/2c down; oats, 1/4c under last night, and provisions less expensive by 2 1/2c to 5c to 6 1/2c.

Wheat showed its best strength at midday. Support was due largely to the temporary failure of predicted moisture in the winter crop belt. Plenty of selling orders came out from the wheat pit when Kansas City sent word that a drizzling rain had begun. Except in the case of the May option, final transactions gave no evidence of any power to rally. Primary receipts were 189,000 bushels against 575,000 bushels a year ago. Export clearances of wheat and flour equalled 706,000 bushels.

Spring-like weather led to considerable speculative pressure on corn. The market, however, weathered a good deal, owing to the stubbornness with which the bulls upheld wheat.

Oats followed other grain downgrades notwithstanding fairly influential buying on weak spots.

Hog receipts furnished a surprise, being for the first time recently above the total of the corresponding day a year ago. Holders of provisions unloaded freely, but shorts and new investors brought about a steadier feeling in the end. Today's range:
