

# REVIEW OF THE BILLS NOW PASSED AND SIGNED BY GOVERNOR STEWART

Interesting Is Synopsis of the Work of the Thirteenth Legislature and the Analysis of the the New Laws It Made.

Helena, March 18.—(Special.)—The new free pass law comes from senate bill 115, which was introduced by the committee on finance and claims. It provides that existing laws shall not be construed to prevent railroads from carrying free or at reduced rates the property of the United States, the state of Montana, or municipalities, fish cars and cars carrying exhibits, and permits the issuance of free or reduced transportation to employees of the roads, and to the officers and employees of other roads, also to doctors, nurses and helpers being taken to wrecks, ministers and persons engaged in charitable work, destitute persons being transported by charity or at public expense, to judicial and legislative officers of the state, including members of the faculties of the state educational institutions, the officers of the Montana State Fair association, and various state officers.

Application for passes must be made to the secretary of state, whose duty it is to forward such applications to railroads of which the transportation is requested. The secretary must keep a record of all passes issued. The charging of mileage by any public official riding on a pass is prohibited.

**House Bill 128, by Sullivan.**  
It is made unlawful for any county, city or town in the state to issue more than one retail liquor license for each 500 inhabitants thereof, provided that any city or town may issue two such licenses whether incorporated or not. Revisions of the law do not apply to existing licenses.

County treasurers shall issue licenses outside of incorporated cities or towns only upon petition first approved by the county commissioners. The signature of 20 freeholders residing within 10 miles of towns or villages is required to each application for a license within such town or village. Applications must be posted for five days in three public places. If a protest is filed by 26 similar resident freeholders the county commissioners shall set a day for hearing. Appeal to the district court may be taken by either party. The county treasurer may renew licenses without petition if there has been no protest filed. Protests must be filed with the county clerk at least 20 days before expiration of licenses. Commissioners shall grant a hearing thereon after having given notice to at least five of the protestants. Issuance of license is discretionary with the board, with appeal to district court permitted to parties interested.

It is provided if there shall have been a second conviction of any person for a penal offense committed upon the premises of any holder of a license, the license may be suspended by the board of county commissioners for three months. If there shall have been a third conviction for a penal offense committed on the premises of a license holder the license is to be canceled and the holder disabled from thereafter securing another license.

**House Bill 84, by Spogen.**  
This law authorizes the state furnishing board to purchase an executive mansion for the use of the governor at a cost not to exceed \$30,000. For furnishing and maintaining the same the first year the sum of \$5,000 is appropriated, and for the second year \$2,500.

**House Bill 90, by McNally.**  
Any person working as a master plumber or journeyman plumber in any city or town of more than 3,000 inhabitants must procure a license. Application is to be made to a board of examiners created by the act. Mayors must appoint such a board of three, one to be a journeyman plumber, one a master plumber, and the other the health officer of the city. Mem-

bers of the board are to receive a per diem of \$5 when in session, such compensation to be paid from the moneys received for licenses. Each master plumber must pay \$10 for a license, and each journeyman plumber \$2, the license to run for a year. For renewals master plumbers are to pay \$2.50 and journeymen \$1. Licenses may be revoked for incapacity or other directions after hearing by the board. Master and journeyman plumbers now in business are not required to submit to an examination, but must deposit the fees required.

**House Bill 51, by Harmon.**  
The county assessors are required in odd numbered years to collect the names and addresses of all owners and breeders of all pure bred horses, cattle, swine and poultry, and to secure the name of the breed. Before November 1 of the same year the assessors shall compile this information and deliver it to the director of the Montana agricultural experiment station at Bozeman.

Pure bred animals are defined to be those recorded in the official books of the various breed associations of the United States. The director of the experiment station is required to furnish assessors with a list of such books. Assessors shall only assess and record breeds when the owner has a certificate of registration. The director of the experiment station is required to prepare a yearly bulletin of all such names and addresses for free distribution.

It is made unlawful for any person to sell an animal with a certificate that does not actually belong to such animal, under penalty of a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$50.

**House Bill 171, by Murray.**  
Provides for the appointment by the board of railroad commissioners of an inspector of navigation, who shall inspect all steam vessels and other boats propelled by machinery, sailing crafts, ferry boats and barges, other than private pleasure boats. The inspector shall be familiar with the construction, operation, etc., of all such boats. He may on inspection require such changes in construction or equipment as he may determine to be necessary for the safety of the public. The number of passengers that may be carried on any craft on the navigable waters of the state.

Owners of vessels described in the act must procure a license from the board of railroad commissioners. The inspector may tie up any vessel whenever he deems such action necessary to comply with the provisions of the act. Owners are guilty of a misdemeanor if they release any boat without permission of the inspector, until the matter has been passed upon by the commissioners.

The board of railway commissioners may revoke licenses. The work of all boats about the boilers, fire boxes, smoke stacks, etc., must be covered by incombustible material. Life saving devices must be carried, and there is an elaborate set of rules governing the operation of all vessels using the navigable waters of the state.

**House Bill 175, by Stewart.**  
This act defines the boundaries of Gallatin county by specific lines, and according to township and section boundaries, and its provisions were agreed to by all the other counties concerned.

**House Bill 373, Appropriations Committee.**  
This directs the state treasurer to transfer from the general fund of the state the sum of \$13,372.39 to the agricultural college of Montana income fund. This transfer is to reimburse that fund for moneys heretofore taken therefrom and used for the land grant

of the agricultural college for the fiscal years 1897 to and including 1912.

**House Bill 264, by Day.**  
Fixes the salary of the marshal of the supreme court at \$1,500 per annum, and permits the usual fees when serving papers in which the state is not a party. Only actual expenses are allowed when the marshal is serving papers for the state.

commander-in-chief and conferring it on Constantine, the bitterest opposition was aroused. He continued to hold the post, however, until the revolutions of the military league in 1909, when he was forced, with other princes, to resign from the army. Allegations of cowardice during the Turkish war were made against him, and it was even thought possible that when he went a short time afterward to visit in the European capitals he would not return to Greece. But, like his father, whose abdication was afterward rumored, he returned in time to more than regain his popularity with the people.

His repeated triumphs in the present war have aroused the wildest enthusiasm, and only a few days ago it was announced that an equestrian statue would be erected in his honor in the capital.

Crown Prince Constantine recently took over the command of the army besting Janina, and, hiding his line and by a military ruse, captured the fortress.

The new queen, who was Princess Sophie, sister of Emperor William of Germany, has become deeply attached to the country of her adoption, and is extremely popular in Greece.

His family were idealized by the easily swayed people. In their enthusiasm for the royal family the people even forgave the king that he had accumulated a large fortune by successful industrial enterprises and stock speculations in Paris and Brussels.

The king's eldest son, Crown Prince Constantine, was married at Athens on October 20, 1889, to Princess Sophie of Prussia, a sister of Emperor William, and his second son, Prince George, appointed high commissioner in Crete after the war, married Princess Marie Bonaparte in 1907. The other children of the king also became connected by marriage with the reigning houses of Russia and Great Britain.

The present war had served to increase the popularity of the king with his devoted people. This week is the fiftieth anniversary of his accession to the throne. The day of his death was the anniversary of the date of his election by the national assembly.

## GREECE'S KING KILLED BY CRAZED ASSASSIN

This fitting climax to his 50 years' reign. "Tomorrow," said the king, "when I pay my formal visit to the dreadnought Goeben—the German battleship which is to honor the Greek king here in Saloniki—that will be with happiness and contentment."

These proved to be the monarch's last words, for at that moment a shot rang out from behind Colonel Franzendis. The king's aide sprang around and seized the hand of the assassin, which was already poised for a second shot. Covering his royal master with his body, he held the assassin until passing soldiers ran to his assistance. But the first shot had found its lodgment. King George had already sunk to the earth. He was lifted into a carriage and with his head resting on his arm, continued to breathe for a short time. But before the hospital was reached life was extinct.

The bullet which was fired at a distance of two paces, entered the back below the shoulder blade. Its point of exit was below the stomach. There was a severe hemorrhage. The fatal wound, which the king always wore, was smothered with blood. "The assassin is a Greek of feeble intellect. He says he was driven to desperation by sickness and want."

**Queen Olga Informed.**  
Athens, March 18.—Queen Olga, who arrived at Athens this evening, will embark at midnight on a Russian cruiser for Saloniki.

The queen was informed of the assassination of the king on board the steamer on which she was returning from a visit to Prevesa. Intense crowds thronged the streets tonight. All the theaters were closed and flags were at half-mast.

**Will Capture Scutari Before Making Peace.**  
London, March 18.—A Podgoritz dispatch says every effort is being made to capture Scutari before peace is concluded. Serbian reinforcements are arriving constantly and the garrison is believed to be short of ammunition as the recent bombardment proved but a weak return fire from the Turks.
