The annual statement of the Young Woman's Christian association was given out yesterday, showing in figures the splendid work done by this organization in Missoula during the last 10 months.

A Year's Record. During the year the Missoula association has performed as follows:

Assisted 160 women and girls in finding employment. Through the Travelers' Aid department has assisted 165 women and children travelers in the past four months. Enrolled 110 in various educational classes. Served 26,700 meals in the cafeteria. Surrounded 20 different girls with the influences of a home. Aided 12 girls in various serious difficulties and emergencies. Furnished accommodations to numerous young women passing through the city alone. Provided Bible study classes and religious meetings. Entertained 760 on social occasions. The financial statement for 1913 is:
