SILCOX GETS HOME WITH CHEERING NEWS

District Forester F. A. Silcox returned home yesterday on train No. 3 after an absence of over a month, during which time he has been in conference with the heads of the other five field districts at Washington and then made a trip south to Charleston, S. C., his old home. Mr. Silcox arrived to find a decided change in climatic conditions from the real summer weather he left in the south and immediately his greeting was over he announced the fact that the underwear in vogue down south was hardly fit and proper for Montana's late spring. "However, I can make the necessary change in clothes," said he, "but I find it is impossible to find any other city which I would care to substitute for Missoula as a place to live. Even at Charleston, my old home, some things were odious by comparison, and the sight of Missoula made me glad. Altogether I have had a very pleasant trip. I stopped at Washington going and coming and had profitable visits with Forester Graves and other officials of the Washington office. It was encouraging to find that the change in administration is scarcely making any drastic changes in the policies of the service and I was also glad to know that field district No. 1 is to get its full share of the general forestry appropriation this season.

"In fact this district is in much better shape now so far as available funds are concerned than it was last year and our plans for the season can be carried out, we feel, without interruption after they are started. On my way south I stopped in Washington to attend a conference of all of the district foresters with Forester Graves, which was for the purpose of determining the basis of allotments for the six field districts. The relative need of each district was taken into consideration in arriving at the best distribution of the funds and district No. 1 was rated as needing more money this year than any of the others. The exact amounts can not be announced yet and our definite plans will depend upon this, but we feel that we can go ahead now and the result of this year's work will mean much to this district in the way of permanent development.

"Forester Graves feels that the new administration will mean but a slight change in the policies or plans of the forest service. The outlook is splendid, he thinks, for the uninterrupted work of the service. The new secretary is a man easily approached and seems to have the public welfare thoroughly at heart."

Mrs. Silcox went south with the forester and will remain with relatives in Charleston for some time.

TONIGHT'S DEBATE FIRST EVENT OF WEEK

GALLATIN COUNTY AND FORSYTH HIGH SCHOOLS WILL FIGHT FOR TITLE.

QUESTION.

CONTESTANTS.

Gallatin County High School, winner in Southern and Western Districts, represented by Don Langhor, Lee Park and Lewellyn Luce, (affirmative).

Forsyth High School, winner in Eastern and Central Districts, represented by Siebert Crum, Clyde Waddington and Ida Peiton, (negative).

The opening exercises of interscholastic week will be the debate for the state championship between the high schools of Gallatin county and Forsyth tonight at 8:30 in the assembly hall at the university. The question to be discussed and the members of the teams are given above.

Although usually looked at in a different light, the debate is nearly as important a victory as the athletic supremacy. Both contestants for the championship have had a struggle to lead their districts and do not mean to let the cup go without a fight.

The judges' decision tonight is especially important to the Gallatin team. If it wins, the university cup will be its permanent property by right of the team's victory last year. To win the cup, one high school must prove itself champion for two consecutive years, or for three years of scattered victories.

Unless some change is made at the last minutes the judges for tonight will be C. W. Tenney of Helena, M. Fitzgerald of Stevensville and Principal S. D. Kelly of the Butte high school.

JOHN HEISER PASSES OVER GREAT DIVIDE
