

CLABBY IS WINNER OVER EDDIE M'GOORTY

AGGRESSIVENESS AND IN-FIGHTING EARN DECISION FOR THE HOOSIER.

Butte, June 13.—In the greatest middleweight boxing contest ever seen in Montana, Jimmy Clabby of Hammond, Ind., earned the decision over Eddie McGoorty of Oshkosh, Wis., here tonight. Referee John H. McLaughlin declaring that the Indiana fighter had a sufficiently wide margin on points to be called the winner. The decision met with popular approval.

In the first round McGoorty had his man almost out. Twice Clabby was sent to the canvas, but he took the count and came back.

Clabby boxed McGoorty even in the second and had a shade the better of the third and also led in the fourth. The fifth was about even, but Clabby again had the sixth and seventh and a shade of the eighth. The ninth was Clabby's best round, McGoorty being in distress in this session. The eleventh and twelfth, the concluding rounds, were practically Clabby's.

Clabby received the decision because of his aggressiveness and superiority at in-fighting.

An effort will be made to match Clabby with Jack Dillon or Bob Mohr for Labor day.

The men are middleweights.

UNIFICATION COMES BEFORE BOARD TODAY

STATE EDUCATIONAL COMMISSION WILL DECIDE ON CHANCELLOR SOON.

Helena, June 13.—(Special.)—The most important matter to be passed upon by the state board of education at the meeting that began this afternoon will be the committee report upon the operation of the Leighton unification bill, and whether a chancellor shall be appointed. This report will be submitted in the morning.

The session today was devoted to routine business and the reports of the heads of the various institutions. They were referred to committees and will be passed upon tomorrow.

A special report, on the accrediting of high schools, was received from a committee appointed at the last meeting. This recommended that the superintendent of public instruction instead of the president of the state university, be the authorized representative of the board in determining the rating of high schools.

Dr. Craighead opposed the recommendation. Action was deferred until after the report on the Leighton bill is received, on motion of C. H. Hall.

DUNCAN TO APPEAL TO THE STATE COMMITTEE

BUTTE MAYOR WILL FIGHT HARD AGAINST REMOVAL BY THE SOCIALISTS.

Butte, June 13.—As a drastic move to avert his possible enforced resignation from office, together with five socialist aldermen, Mayor Lewis J. Duncan will appeal to the state executive committee of the socialist party, a meeting of which has been called in this city for next Sunday.

Mayor Duncan will urge the revocation of the charter of the Butte socialist local with the proposed organization of a local not controlled by the I. W. W.

It is Mayor Duncan's refusal to have his administration of the affairs of the city of Butte controlled by the I. W. W. that has led up to the lodging of charges against him and a quintet of socialist aldermen by the so-called radicals.

EX-SOLDIER FACES MURDER CHARGE IN FRISCO

FORMER SERGEANT ALLEGED TO HAVE BURNED WIFE AND THREE SONS.

San Francisco, June 13.—George H. Schall, formerly a sergeant in the United States army, arrived here today from Vancouver, Wash., where he was taken into custody by a deputy United States Marshal and brought back in connection with the burning to death of his wife and three sons in their cottage in the Presidio here the night of April 24.

Schall declared that he was innocent and expressed a desire for an early trial.

The bodies of the wife and three children have been exhumed and are being examined under the direction of the federal grand jury. A chemical examination of the stomachs, partially completed, has revealed no trace of poison, the chemist reports. No traces of injuries attributable to violence previous to death from fire were discernible.

MONOPLANE FALLS COUNTY OF FALLON WAS STIFLED 'TIS SAID

BIRDMAN WITH PASSENGER SAYS TOO SHARP A TURN AND MACHINE DROPS.

London, June 13.—Lieutenant James R. Kennedy of the naval wing of the royal flying corps, was killed and C. Gordon Bell, another aviator, was seriously injured in the fall of a monoplane near the Brooklands aerodrome today. Bell was driving the machine with Kennedy as a passenger.

The monoplane, at a height of about 30 feet, was flying at the rate of 80 miles an hour when Bell essayed a turn and banked the machine at too great an angle. The nose of the machine dipped suddenly and a wing struck the ground, causing the aeroplane to turn turtle.

Both Kennedy and Bell were buried in the wreckage.

This is the second fatality in less than a month, Lieutenant Desmond L. Arthur of the 78th battalion, Royal Munster Fusiliers, having been killed near Monrovia, Scotland, May 27.

COMMISSIONERS OF CUSTER COUNTY MUST APPEAR BEFORE SUPREME COURT.

Helela, June 13.—(Special.)—An echo of the legislative fight over the creation of Wibaux county came up in the supreme court today when an alternative writ of mandamus was obtained directing the Custer county board of commissioners to rescind its action stifling Fallon county, or show cause, June 23, when the case will be heard on its merits.

It is charged that in granting petitions for the exclusion of territory for the proposed county of Fallon, the board refused to consider all the qualified electors residing in the territory sought to be excluded, but limited the number to those who are registered voters.

It is further charged that the board refused to consider the withdrawals of signatures from the petitions after the date set for the hearing, and that had these been considered, the petitions would have been denied.

or the wood pulp used in the manufacture of such paper or board."

Against Canada.

Although the word "Canada" is omitted from the amendment adopted by the committee, it would operate against Canada because of that nation's restrictions on exports of wood and chemical pulp. Senator Simmons, chairman of the finance committee, said that other proposed restrictive provisions, or countervailing duties aimed against Canada, had not been acted upon by the majority, and that the matter would be taken up again tomorrow.

Under the reciprocity amendment, pulp wood or paper can come in free from Canada when it is the product of lands in Canada, unrestricted by export duty or license fee.

"I believe," Senator Simmons said, "that the committee can conclude its work by next Wednesday, and that the bill can be reported to the senate by June 25."


