

NO CLUE IS FOUND TO THE SLAYER OF SHYLOCK

INORDINATE LOVE FOR SPARKLERS MAY HAVE LED TO THE MAN'S MURDER.

Los Angeles, June 26.—Investigation today into the murder of Charles E. Pendell, a money-lender, only tended to increase the confusion of circumstances surrounding the case.

Examination of the safety deposit boxes in two banks where the real estate dealer and money-lender kept his valuables and papers, also failed to prove that anything was missing which might have a connection with the murder.

"The loss may be \$1,000 or \$10,000 or \$100,000, I do not know," said the son, Pendell's attorney, who is being held accountable by many for the murder.

In disposing of the defendant's counter-charge of desertion, the supreme court holds that the plaintiff's excuse was sufficient to warrant him in leaving her.

It was contended on behalf of the defendant that her husband's complaint should have been denied on the grounds of cohabitation.
