Highlanders Are Beaten 5 to 0 by Red-Headed Southpaw—Daly Is Hit Hard, but Dawson Holds Electrics to Brace of Hits in Six Long Innings.

## BATTLES ON COAST MAKE THIS REAL GALA DAY

PROGRAM FOR FOURTH IS THE MOST ELABORATE FOR MANY, MANY MOONS.

Today is the biggest sporting day of the year on the Pacific. The Fourth of July finds capital events in boxing, baseball, swimming, rowing, tennis and automobile and horse racing dotted down the length of the coast.

First in general interest comes the two firstweight boxing bouts at San Francisco and Los Angeles, one of which will decide the lightweight championship, and the other in all probability the next recommended challenger for that title. Willie Ritchie, the champion, meets Joe Rivers of Los Angeles at San Francisco in a bout that may go 20 rounds. Betting stands 10 to 8 on Ritchie, with the champion wearing \$1,000 on his own chances at the ruling odds. The fight is generally conceded to promise more interest than any battle in the same division since Battling Nelson lost the title to Al Wolgast at Richmond, Cal. Forty thousand dollars is expected to be bet.

At Los Angeles, "Bud" Anderson of Medford, Ore., will meet Leach Cross of New York. Cross is a veteran, erratic, but always dangerous. Anderson is the most promising of the newcomers. Probably the winner will be matched for the title with the champion proclaimed at San Francisco. Anderson's last two victories were knockouts of "Knockout" Brown, New York, and Joe Mandel, New Orleans. The betting favors him, 10 to 7.

Joe Willard and Al Williams, among the white hopes, meet for 15 rounds at Reno, and Antoine LaGrave and Rubie Erens, welterweights, at Yaff, Cal.

## Knight Hurts Boxing Game by Pulling Ancient Stall

Heralded Boxing Exhibition Turned Into Expensive Fiasco When One Preliminary Is Cancelled, Other Stopped in Second and Principal Quits.

The Kiley boxing bill received another hard clip in the jaw last evening. Phil Knight, one of the beneficiaries of the statute stung the hand that fed him by quitting cold in the fifth round of his scheduled 12-round muss with George Kelly. Knight claimed a foul, but his stall was a poor one and was not upheld by the physicians who represented the state commission. State Inspector Trainor said: "There's no getting around it. Knight just laid down and quit."

Last night's was the second bill and the second disappointment handed the Missoula public since the adoption of the Kiley bill. A few weeks ago a fighter who assumed the name of Frankie White quit in the middle of the fifth round of his scheduled 12-round muss with George Kelly. Two expensive flashes in the pan are the benefits which Missoula has received from the Kiley bill.

It isn't the fault of the Missoula Athletic club, under whose auspices the frosty exhibition of the so-called manly art was staged. The local club went to a lot of expense in securing fighters who were said to be good. But the fight was a frost and a good many people were stung for amounts varying from \$1 to \$4. Somebody is to blame. The club did its best, the public isn't going to stand for it much longer. The Kiley bill, hailed as the rescuator of the fight game, has produced at least two frosts. The only assailable fight staged in the state, so far as Missoula fans know, was the Chubby-McGoorty muss in Butte. That was passable because it was well-hearsed. Chubby and McGoorty were given the home laugh last week when they tried to come their moving picture stuff in Wisconsin, their home state.

If the men behind the boxing game in the state expect to make the Kiley bill a success, they will have to tone up the class of fighters Montana has developed. These fiascos are killing the sport. Kelly was the favorite of the main exhibition from the first, although none in the audience expected to see him finish Knight as early as the fifth round. In that round both gave and took heavy body blows until in the last half of the frame Kelly backed Knight to the ropes with a series of short jabs in the stomach, and with some assistance by Knight himself put his opponent through the referee's eyes had been calling to the referee.
