

CLOSING OF BANK DOESN'T AFFECT MARKET

TROUBLES OF PITTSBURGH INSTITUTIONS ARE HELD TO BE PURELY LOCAL.

New York, July 7.—News in which Wall street was especially interested today was nearly all of a banish turn and as there was no outside demand to sustain the market, quotations were lowered generally.

Most attention was paid to the closing of a Pittsburgh bank and the receivership of a related concern. It was generally understood that the causes which led up to the suspension of the bank were purely local and that no unfavorable inferences could be drawn regarding the banking position in general.

The heaviness of stocks persisted throughout the session. Declines were mostly fractional but a number of representative stocks lost a point or more.

Bonds were under slight pressure. Total sales par value, \$1,543,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

COMMISSION VISITS HUNGARIAN FARM

GOVERNMENT'S BREEDING OF HORSES INTERESTS AGRICULTURAL EXPERTS.

Mezőhegyes, Hungary, July 7.—As the guests of the Hungarian government, members of the American commission on agricultural co-operation were shown over the government breeding farm here today.

Horse breeding is one of the important industries of Hungary. The most noticeable characteristic of a Hungarian city to the stranger is the appearance of the horses on the streets. Even the cabs are two horse vehicles and the horses would do credit to many a private turnout in the United States.

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In the breeding of cows an effort is made to secure an animal that will serve both as a dairy cow and as a draft animal for the small farmers of Hungary work their cows as well as to use them for milk.

The American commission was taken to the farm by a special train from Budapest. A cavalry post is maintained on the farm and the Americans were quartered in the officers' barracks.

The government farm requires so many people as herdsmen and stable hands, besides the cavalry post, that it is quite a good-sized village. Here especially the visitor was impressed with the enormous part played by the government in the development of agriculture.
