ferred arbitration weeks ago, but our offer was rejected. In the formal report of the vote of the men on such a strike it is set forth that the conference committee authorized to act for such "declined to make any concessions or grant any portion of the increase in wages asked for or changed working conditions required, and in addition have refused to submit the controversy to arbitration under the federal law in effect governing such matters."

The issue being thus drawn, and the men having voted to strike if their demands were refused, it remained for the general committee of the men to ratify the strike vote. This was done today, and according to the leaders, the railroads will be given probably until Tuesday to change their attitude, when if they still refuse the strike order will be issued calling 30,000 or more men from work with a possibility that this number will be augmented by thousands of engineers and firemen.

As to whether the engineers and firemen would join in a sympathetic strike, Mr. Garretson said: "The engineers and firemen are not bound to go out on strike with us. On the contrary, they are bound to remain at their positions until such time as they think their lives and the lives of their passengers are endangered by having inexperienced men on the trains."

Peculiar Situation. Mr. Garretson explained that the debate on the amendments to the Erbsman act before President Wilson would present a peculiar situation. He said: "We will be there to argue that the Newlands bill be passed as drafted, and lined up with us will be the railroads. W. C. Brown, president of the New York Central; Samuel Rae of the Pennsylvania, and Daniel Willard of the Baltimore & Ohio will represent the railroads and speak for the passage of the bill."
