BONNER IS MAKING FINAL ROAD SURVEY

GEOGRAPHER OF FOREST SERVICE ICE SOON READY TO CALL FOR BIDS ON ROAD.

Geographer Frank Bonner of the forest service left yesterday morning for the Big Hole district at the head of the Bitter Root valley, where he goes to make the final surveys of the co-operative road that is to be constructed over the divide into the Big Hole valley from the Bitter Root. The forest service contributes, through the special road fund that goes to each district to be apportioned for new roads where the counties will assist, about one-third of the total cost.

In addition to this has full charge of the awarding of the contract and the supervision of the work. Mr. Bonner's trip at this time is to secure data for the specifications so that the bids may be advertised for at once and the contracts let as soon as possible.

It is hoped and believed that the road can be completed this fall. It is nearly 25 miles long, and is one of the badly needed pieces of the otherwise-passable park-to-park highway. Mr. Bonner should return with his data within a few days.
