

METAL PRODUCTION OF IDAHO

The value of the mine output of precious and semiprecious metals in Idaho in 1912, according to C. N. Gorry of the United States geological survey, was \$21,466,521, against \$19,109,894 in 1911.

The production of gold was valued at \$1,381,214, only slightly more than in 1911. The yield from deep mines was about \$22,000 less in 1912 than in 1911, but the yield recovered by dredging and other placer-mining methods was \$228,000 larger.

The silver output was \$2,294,745 ounces, an increase of less than 1 per cent. About 84 per cent of the silver yield was derived from lead ores and 6 per cent from lead-zinc ores.

The production of copper increased from 5,152,937 pounds, valued at \$644,117, in 1911, to 7,482,152 pounds, valued at \$1,236,205, in 1912, although the Lost Packer smelter was not operated.

The lead production in 1912 was 284,185,657 pounds, valued at \$12,788,355, an increase of 11,829,132 pounds.

Record shipments of zinc ore and concentrates were made in 1912 when the production of zinc was 13,995,952 pounds, valued at \$69,9478. The in-crease of 5,555,253 pounds was due mainly to larger shipments of concen-
