

STOCK MOVEMENTS ARE DIMINISHED BUT STRONG

MARKET OPENS WITH ACTIVITY, BUT SINKS TOWARD CLOSE OF AFTERNOON.

New York, July 28.—The improvement in stocks which signalled last week's operations continued today, but in diminished volume. Such leaders as Amalgamated Copper, United States Steel, Union Pacific and Reading, all rose to a higher level. Trading, however, was of the same professional nature. Houses with Boston connections were prominent on the buying side of copper.

Today's early activity, which gave way to extreme dullness, later was largely at the expense of the short interest, which was driven to retirement of commitments, particularly in copper, steel and Union Pacific. Amalgamated was strongest of active issues, its two-point rise coinciding with another advance in the metal to a fraction over 15 points. Steel strength was ascribed to expectations of a favorable statement tomorrow. In the railway division, which was greatly stimulated by the action of the eastern railway managers in withdrawing their grievances with the trustees, the southwest group developed sudden activity with gains of one to three points, while the Hill issues added to last Saturday's gains. Canadian Pacific, Soo, Reading and the Erie also were well to the fore.

Advances elsewhere included American Beet Sugar, Harvester and the petroleum shares, the latter assisted by reports of an increase in the price of that commodity.

The final saw numerous recessions. London exercised some influence, buying about \$1,000 shares, mainly Amalgamated and the Erie. The Bank of England acquired most of the South African gold delivered to that market. Paris is strong and Berlin firm.

The local bond market was steady, but government issues continued weak with new low records for the two, the Panama twos and threes. Total sales, par value, \$1,618,000.

Chicago, July 28.—Huge primary receipts acted as a burden today on wheat. The market closed nervous, 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ down. Corn showed a net gain of 3/4¢ to 1¢, with oats very little from 1/2¢ decline to 3/4¢ advance.

The outcome for provisions ranged from 2 1/2¢ off to an gain of 10¢. Arrivals of wheat today at the chief terminal cities reached the extraordinary total of 3,128,000 bushels, as against 2,339,000 bushels at the corresponding time a year ago.
