### WOMEN WILL MEET AT THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

THE MISSIONARY SESSIONS OF THE METHODISTS WILL BE UNUSUALLY INTERESTING.

Stevensville, Aug. 10.—(Special).—The thirty-sixth annual session of the Montana conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South will be held in Stevensville this week. It will be the third time within ten years that the conference has met in Stevensville.

The conference of the Woman's Missionary society of the state will meet in conjunction with the conference, its sessions being limited to Thursday and Friday, while the church conference will last for six days, commencing on Tuesday evening, and concluding on Monday morning of next week.

Bishop R. G. Waterhouse of Los Angeles will be president of the conference, and he is expected to arrive here Tuesday. The bishop will make the appointments for the ensuing year, probably on next Sunday evening or the following Monday morning. Rev. P. D. Hartman of Stevensville, who is presiding elder of the Missoula district, will be the host of the conference.

Tuesday evening Dr. C. A. Rexroad of Butte, presiding elder of the Helena district, will open the conference sessions with the formal sermon. The sessions will be held in the Southern Methodist Episcopal church, which is one of the oldest in western Montana.

Reverend Hartman of the local church, and the local people are making arrangements to entertain the visitors during their stay in Stevensville. It is expected about 50 ministers and lay delegates will be here.

Stevensville, Aug. 10.—(Special).—Free ice cream and buttermilk to everybody—that's one of the features of the creamery picnic and celebration to be held here Thursday, and fully three thousand people are expected to gather here. That don't mean one dish of ice cream, but the order, "fill 'em up again," will be complied with, and cream galore will be on hand to supply the demand.

Every featured during the entire day will be free to all with the exception of an exhibition tent, where the aeroplane of Walter Beck, the Missoula aviator, will be housed until his flight. A small charge will be made to inspect the heater-thrust-air machine, and to have its workings explained. The money thus raised will be for Mr. Beck. Stevensville wants him to get as much as possible for his flight, and this concession is made together with his contract price. With this and a charge for the dance will be the only places that money will be good in connection with the celebration.

At a late hour last night the committee had arranged with the Missoula band, one of the best bands in western Montana to be here, and they will arrive bright and early Thursday morning.

### HOPE HOSPITAL GETS A NEW X-RAY MACHINE

WALLACE, AUG. 10.—(SPECIAL).—YESTERDAY THE HOPE HOSPITAL'S NEW X-RAY GENERATOR ARRIVED. THIS IS A WAPPEL-KING MODEL, INTERRUPTLESS, WHICH IS THE VERY LATEST THING IN X-RAY GENERATORS.

Wallace, Aug. 10.—(Special).—Yesterday the Hope hospital's new X-Ray generator arrived. This is a Wappel-King model, interruptless, which is the very latest thing in X-Ray generators. The last patent having been gotten last December. The machine generates a current of 120 volts and can take a radiograph of the stomach or heart in 10 seconds. The old machines would show a letter or piece of metal in the body but the physician was unable to tell how deeply it was buried. With this new instrument it can be determined just how far from the surface the substance lies. This is the first one to be installed in Idaho and, although there are a few others in the larger cities of the northwest, they are by no means common.



### HE NEVER SPECULATED SAYS GOVERNOR SULZER

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 10.—After a long conference, tonight with some of his close political advisers, Governor Sulzer issued a short statement, denying absolutely that he ever used campaign funds for speculative purposes. He says he never heard of the stock brokerage firm of Fisher & Gray and Hoover & Gray, alleged transactions with which he figured largely in the testimony before the Gray legislative committee until these names were brought out before the committee.

The governor admits he did apply certain campaign contributions to his personal use but adds that he made good the amount. He also admits having had transactions with the stock firm of Harris & Fuller, but insists that his account with this firm was not speculative but on stock and collateral. He denies that he ever speculated in Wall street.
