The clocks are running double-quick, vacation's end draws near; there's little comfort for the kid, HARD for schooltime's almost LINES here; the calendar leaves fall now like rain, though there's been no touch of frost; days never passed like this before—playtime is almost lost; the last of Union-league home games, the best of fishing time—A send-a-kid to school right now is nothing less than crime; the roads are fine for biking, the hills are prime for tramp; the water's fine for swimming—no danger now of cramps; apples are ripe in orchards, the weighted boughs hang low—everything is fine outdoors—a feller has no show; the streams invite, the hills call loud, the outdoor lure is strong; but the melon-bell days are here—right where they don't belong.

If there's a busier place in town than the alley back of The Missoulian building, it should be a busy PLACE reported at once, for to this alley goes the credit of being the real center of building activity these days, unless the main building of some contractor which has not reported yet. Up toward Higgins avenue the new Florence hotel is being built and most of the work at present is on the north wing, which comes out to this alley. A big concrete mixer is grinding here and a long line of material barrows grooves back and forth in endless chain. An upper story is being added to The Missoulian building, which will provide for an expansion of the plant made necessary by the plan to publish permanently The Sentinel from this establishment in the afternoon. The addition will accommodate the editorial offices of The Missoulian and The Sentinel in front and in the rear will be established the book bindery and job printing plant. The transfer of the job printing department from the ground-floor composing room will give the mechanical department of the newspapers the room needed. The construction of this story adds to the activity in the alley. Immediately to the west an addition is being built on the Lester building, which will enable Hans Jensen to handle better his business than he has been able to do in his present crowded quarters. With these three building contracts going ahead, the old alley—the oldest alley in Missoula—is losing its ancient peace and quiet. Things are doing.

Saturday will be a great day in Ovando. The upper Blackfoot country will celebrate Labor day a little in advance of the calendar date and will combine with its celebration a regular old-fashioned field day reunion of the folks in the whole Blackfoot region. There will be a baseball game, there will be footraces, there will be horse races—not the better kind—and there will be good things to eat. Scotty Brown and Charles Jakways are billed for addresses and the committee in charge promises a good time to all who attend. Missoula should send up a delegation of business men to participate in this celebration. It will be a fine opportunity to get acquainted with our neighbors up the river, for they will all be lunched up and they will all be glad to see folks from this end of the river. Early in the week there was some talk of organizing a party to drive up the river Saturday morning and visit with the Ovando people and their neighbors. The plan should not be dropped. It will be a fine outing and the visitors will see one of the finest valleys in the world at its best.

Rev. H. S. Gately said last night to the Man About Town in answer to a question: "We have not decided definitely upon any plans for building a new church. Since the present building and its site were sold to the school district there have been a good many tenders made of locations for the new church which we expect to build, but we haven't even decided whether to build on the north side or the south side of the river. The delay in the school election made the decision an item that is not possible for us to get started with a building before spring. The school trustees have said that they will not hurry us in leaving this property, but we know they are anxious to get the manual training work started, and it may be that we shall make arrangements somewhere for temporary quarters. But all this is speculation. There has been no definite action and certainly there will be no building plans to announce before spring."

There is still deep mystery connected with the recent assault upon Conductor John Dinnen of the Northern Pacific at Ravalli. There is no question as to the fact that there was an assault. The reports of all the railway men agree that the assault was committed by Frank Simons and that Simons and Special Officer Ramsey of the bootlegger service had been drinking together on the train. Equally positive are men in the government service that Ramsey was not drinking with Simons. The Missoulian has made inquiry as far as possible and this is the result, that two directly contradictory statements are made regarding the case as far as Ramsey's connection was it is concerned. At first there was denial that anybody had been drinking with Simons, but now United States Commissioner Smith has this theory, which he has suggested to the Man About Town: "I believe that somebody has been impersonating Ramsey. As nearly as I can find out there is a man who much resembles Ramsey, but I have not been able to learn his name. I think this is the man who was drinking with Simons and that the witnesses are mistaken in identifying him."

PLANS TO BE READY FOR NEW SCHOOL REAL SOON

BOARD ASKS BAKKE TO BE ARCHITECT AND TRANSACTS OTHER BUSINESS.

The Missoula school board met last evening at the home of Dr. McCall and transacted considerable business relative to the opening of school in the Missoula district next Tuesday morning. An architect was employed to prepare the plans for the proposed new school building in the Rattlesnake district and Miss Helen Duncan of Battle Creek, Mich., was engaged as physical director of the schools. After the session the board was tendered a banquet at the McCall home which was thoroughly enjoyed, all members of the board being present.

Bakke Is Chosen. Architects J. H. Kennedy, Ole Ekkles and Luk & Hare had plans to submit to the board last night for the new school building that is to be constructed in the Rattlesnake district as soon as the bonds recently voted are sold. Ole Bakke was instructed to proceed with complete plans and specifications and present them to the board for approval. The bonds are to be sold on September 11 and the board wants everything ready to call for bids on the building as soon after that date as possible.

Physical Director. Miss Duncan of Battle Creek, whom the board decided upon as physical director, is a graduate of the normal college of physical education of that city and her recommendations have been of the highest order. She will reach Missoula on Friday to get settled and plan the opening work for the year.

Buildings Ready. The committee on grounds and buildings reported last evening that all of the improvement work ordered last spring has been completed and that the buildings and grounds at every school are fit and ready for the pupils. The only piece of work yet to be completed this fall is the sidewalk along the north side of the Lowell building. This was ordered in last night.

Principals Busy. Superintendent Williams reported that the principals of every building were busy already. They having had a meeting Monday to outline the co-operative work for the opening term. L. C. Emms of Dekator, Ill., director of manual training, is also in the city and at work in his department. He is busy getting the tools in shape and the shops arranged for the young mechanics.

WHAT THE LOYOLA OFFERS YOUTH OF MISSOULA

ANNOUNCEMENT OF PLANS AND COURSES OFFERED AT SCHOOL WHICH OPENS TUESDAY.

The Loyola high school will open its doors Tuesday, September 2, for the scholastic term. The school is under the personal supervision of the Fathers of the Society of Jesus, whose aim as educators is to procure the development of mind and heart. They know from vast experience that moral training is absolutely necessary for the proper education of youth, and therefore while cultivating the mental faculties to their highest development, the formation of the habits of virtue are always insisted upon.

The Jesuit system theorizes at developing side by side, the moral and intellectual faculties of the student and sending forth to the world men of solid judgment, of acute and rounded intellect, of upright and manly conscience. And since men are not made better citizens by the mere accumulation of knowledge, without a guiding and controlling force, the principal force to be developed are the normal faculties. Moreover, morality is to be taught continuously; it must be the vital force animating the whole organic structure of education. It must breathe the atmosphere the student breathes. It must suffuse with its light all that he reads, illuminate all that he writes, give to his life and give to the true and the false their relative light and shade. In a word, the purpose of Jesuit teaching is to lay a solid structure in the whole mind and character for any superstructure of sciences, professional and special, as well as for the abiding of moral, social and religious life. Every one to be developed are the normal faculties of centuries, the fathers offer the youth of Missoula the following course of studies for the coming term:

Courses. Latin, Greek, English, mathematics, elementary sciences, modern languages, French, German, Spanish, bookkeeping, stenography, typewriting, music, instrumental and vocal; physical culture; besides the regular four years there is a preparatory class corresponding to the eighth grade, where pupils are prepared for the regular high school course.

E. Trahor will again conduct the physical culture classes, begun and continued so successfully last year. This is an integral part of the high school curriculum, affording ample, healthy exercise to provide a sound body for a normal mind.

Loyola has the best equipped gymnasium in Missoula, if not in the state, and this is always at the disposal of the student. Those who are musically inclined are given special encouragement and opportunity to advance themselves by admittance into the Loyola orchestra. The special object of this organization is the rendering of classical music; nor is the drama forgotten. The initial performance of the Dramatic society last year was the occasion of developing some really splendid actors who will in the near future produce the Shakespearean comedy, "Twelfth Night."

Announcement. The following announcement concerning the school has been made: A limited number of students of any denomination are admitted, although Loyola is a Catholic high school, and all are required to show a respectful demeanor during the ordinary exercises of public prayer. Catholic students are required to approach the sacraments of penance and holy eucharist every month. As there can be no true education that is complete and harmonious development of the intellect and heart of man without religion, the study of the Christian doctrine is required daily, and weekly lectures are given on it for further and deeper enlightenment.

The faculty for the coming term: Rev. P. L. Dillon, S. J., Rev. G. A. Gilbert, S. J., Rev. P. Bourke, S. J., J. E. Lorenz, M. E. Duffiver, C. Menager and E. Trahor. Mr. Lorenz, the new member, comes from Chicago. He is an accomplished violinist and will have charge of the stringed-instrument department of the high school.
