

TOURIST CARRIERS ARE SUFFERING IN PARK

HORSES USED FOR GLACIER SIGHTSEERS ILL-TREATED AND LEFT TO STARVE.

Eddle horses used by tourists in Glacier park are suffering sadly from inhumane treatment according to a statement made by Deputy Humane Officer James K. Lang of Kalispell, who traveled through the park last week.

On arriving at Helton he journeyed up to St. Mary's lake, continuing on through the park on the regular trail used by the transportation companies.

From one outfit ten out of twelve animals were condemned and taken to pasture to regain their health and strength.

But worse than the treatment given to the animals who managed to make the trip was that accorded to those which were unable to do so.

In such weakened condition the horses are naturally not so sure-footed as when properly taken care of and two accidents occurred which could have probably been avoided had proper care been given the animals.
