Should Be Restricted.
Senator Cummins declared the stock exchange should be restricted to actual sales. "As it is now, it is not a place for the transfer of actual commodities," he added. CARNEGIE COMMISSION DENOUNCED BY GREEKS

Salonki, Sept. 1.—The newspaper Liberto, in denouncing the Carnegie commission for the investigation of alleged atrocities committed in the Balkans, to the membership of which both Servians and Greeks objected, says that the Greek government asked for an inquiry as long ago as July 19, but wanted judges and arbitrators, not counselors and prosecutors. Moreover, the paper continues, it is too late now for a useful investigation, as the victims are buried and all the real evidence is obliterated. Finally, the paper declares, the commission was not an impartial one, Professor Mitukoff and Dr. Brailford, representing Russia and Great Britain, respectively, being notoriously in favor of the Bulgarians.

Dillon, Sept. 1.—The first accident of the duck hunting season which opened today occurred here this morning when Leslie Dodds, aged 14, shot himself in the hip while pulling the gun out of a boat. The boy is probably fatally injured.
