KOCH TO REFOREST BURNED-OVER LAND

SUPERVISOR OF LOLO FOREST TO PLANT SEEDLING IN LARGE TRACT.

This week the forest service will undertake the task of reforesting another of the great areas burned over by the heavy fires of 1910. Supervisor Elmer Koch of the Lolo forest will leave at once for the burned area in the forest between DeBorgia and Salt Lake where he will plant 300 acres of burned land with white and yellow pine seedlings from the Savenac nursery. The service already has reforested several large burned areas and has been very successful. From 75 to 95 per cent of the seedlings set out have survived and are now growing rapidly. Within the course of the next few years almost all of the country swept by flames in 1910 will be covered with a fresh growth of pines. Supervisor Koch will keep a force of six men busy for some time on this new tract. No attempt is to be made to clear away the burned timber. The seedlings are placed wherever there is an open spot and in a large majority of cases thrive. In most of the clear d'Alene district, for that matter, the fire swept the forest clean and the debris is not heavy. Owing to the proximity of the nursery the cost of reforesting this area will be slight, amounting only to about \$5 an acre.
