

TRADING IN STOCKS IS GENERALLY LIGHT

LACK OF DEMAND FEATURES IN THE DAY AMONG WALL STREET TRADERS.

New York, Nov. 15.—Trading in stocks was light throughout the half-day session and in most cases net changes were only nominal. After a firm opening the market became heavy, more because of a lack of demand than from any marked pressure. Investment buyers held aloof. Speculators were cautious and inclined to take the bear side because of the absence of support and the continued weakness of various stocks, such as Missouri Pacific, New Haven and Lehigh Valley. Losses were small, however, and they were largely made up on scattered buying toward the close. Lehigh Valley was heavy throughout. New Haven made a new low record at 75c. Missouri Pacific at 24 1/2 was at the year's lowest.

There was a general disposition to wait developments in regard to Mexican affairs. The bank statement made the expected good showing. The bond market was irregular with heaviness in some well-known issues. Total sales (par value), \$509,000. United States 4s advanced 1/2 cent on call on the week.



SISTERS OF CHARITY MUST REGISTER AS NURSES

ATTORNEY GENERAL KELLY SO INTERPRETS THE LAW RECENTLY PASSED.

Helena, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—All Montana hospitals will be interested in an opinion rendered by the office of Attorney General D. M. Kelly today to County Attorney D. J. Heyford of Missoula in which it is held that all persons who assume the title of nurse must comply with the provisions of the law, regarding the calling of such persons as bear the title. The query was in reference to Sisters of Charity who conduct St. Patrick's hospital at Missoula.

"A second proposition is contained in your letter," the opinion continues, "You state that this hospital also maintains a training school for nurses, and the eight sisters, who are nurses in the hospital, also assist in the teaching in the school. Attention is called to rule 10 adopted by the Montana state board of examination and registration for nurses, which rule is as follows: 'The superintendent of nurses and head nurses must be graduated nurses and registered nurses.'"

"The question arises as to whether this board can thus arbitrarily designate such as 'head nurses' and thus compel them to register in order to have the school recognized as an accredited school. Since the object of this act is the regulation of the business or profession of nursing, and subject matter which, undoubtedly falls within the proper exercise of police powers of the state and since the act itself provides for a board of examiners for nurses, and provides for a schedule of subjects upon which applicants shall be examined to qualify for registration under the act, and further makes the president of this board an inspector of training schools, and places general supervisory control in this board over training schools in this state, I am of the opinion that the board is within its rights in making such a requirement as is contained in rule 10.

"I am of the belief this board is not required to recognize such school as an accredited school, unless every reasonable rule and requirement of this board is complied with."

PEPPARD AWARDED CONTRACT FOR BRIDGE


MISSOULA MAN WILL CONSTRUCT NEW CROSSING OVER BLODGETT CREEK.

Hamilton, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—At a special meeting of the board of county commissioners today bids were opened and the contract for the construction of a bridge across Blodgett creek on the west side county road two miles north of this city let to O. E. Peppard of Missoula. Four bids on the job were received as follows: O. E. Peppard, \$225,000; Lord & McGuire, \$298,750; J. F. Harrington, \$1,007.
The bridge will be constructed a few rods east from the present structure, as was stated in today's Missoulian, and will have a 20-foot span. The bridge will be a wooden affair with concrete piers. Mr. Peppard was in Hamilton today and stated that he would begin work on the bridge immediately, his contract specifying that the bridge be completed within 60 days from the date of the contract. It will not be necessary to close the old bridge to travel during the construction of the new crossing.
