

FLAGPOLE IS TAKEN TO JUMBO'S TOP THIS DAY

MONSTER FLAG IS ORDERED AND SOON DAD FARLEY'S PLAN WILL BE REALIZED.

If 50 feet of flagpole flying a flag 16 feet wide and 26 feet long can't be plainly seen from all sections of Missoula and the immediate surrounding country when the pole is planted on Mount Jumbo's back, then Dad Farley and all those interested in his plan to have a national banner floating from that hill gate-guarding mountain will be disappointed. Yesterday the plans were completed for a pole of this length to be taken to the top of Jumbo and a hole dug for it today. The pole was donated by Manager George Brown of the Missoula Light & Water company and after it is dragged to the top of the hill he will send up an experienced crew of men to set it properly.

Monster Flag.

Then the flag, which was donated by the Knights of Columbus, was ordered yesterday. The lodge sent word to Dad Farley to name the size he thought would be necessary, and to make it big enough to do some good. Dad held a conference and selected the size mentioned. This will cost about \$35, but it is made to stand the weather and is certainly large enough to be plainly seen.

A few more names were added to the subscription lists yesterday and these will probably be taken up today because a large sum of money will not be needed, now that the flag and the pole have both been donated. The list of subscribers will be printed and as soon as the work is done an accounting will be made and the figures given in full.

The climb to the top of Jumbo with a 50-foot pole is not going to be an easy task. A big team will handle the timber, hauling it with one end lashed to the front part of a heavy wagon's running gears. The job was contracted by William H. Stennett, who lives in the Rattlesnake valley.

WHEN SEASON ENDS FOR BIG GAME IT'S FINAL

GAME WARDEN DEHART SAYS THAT PRACTICE OF SHOOTING AFTER DATE MUST STOP.

The open season for big game in Montana closes next Monday. This means that it is unlawful to shoot protected game after that date. Some hunters who have happened to be in the field on other years at the season's end have insisted that so long as they were in camp and had had bad luck, it was no harm and within the spirit of the law to remain a day or two longer and attempt to get some game. This looked reasonable enough from their viewpoint, perhaps, but it does not sound good to the state game department to make the matter perfectly plain, State Game Warden DeHart recently made the following statement:

"Recently I have received numerous letters asking whether deer and elk may be hunted on December 1. The law says that the open season is between the dates of October 1 and December 1, and naturally that settles the question. It is just as illegal to hunt big game on December 1 as it is any other date during the closed season."

WESLEYAN CAMPAIGN IS MAKING PROGRESS

The following bulletin concerning the endowment campaign of the Wesleyan university has been sent out by President Board:

The Montana Wesleyan campaign progresses. The series of banquets that were held in various centers of the state were brought to a successful close with the banquet at Chiswick a few days ago. Rev. W. W. Van Orsdel, D. D., accompanied Mr. Strader of Lincoln, Neb., who is managing the campaign, and Dr. Bévard, president of the university, to those various centers. Conferences were held with 90 per cent of the ministers of the state. Plans were laid for the exchange of pulpits on Sunday, November 23. Sermons on Christian education will be preached throughout the state. On Sunday, November 20, every minister in the state will preach in his own pulpits on the same subject. From the first to the tenth of December, committees of solicitation will work in every locality in Montana. Thousands of printed pages have been sent out from the central office at Helena. Word has been received from all over the state, indicating that all ministers are at work and laymen are joining them. It is the belief beyond a doubt that the tenth day of December will see \$75,000 subscribed for the endowment and extension of the school.
