CRAIGHEAD CHOSEN PEACE COUNCIL MEMBER

PRESIDENT OF UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA RECEIVES IMPORTANT APPOINTMENT.

Dr. E. B. Craighead, president of the University of Montana, has been appointed a member of the National Citizens' committee, which has in charge the calling of the third international peace conference at The Hague, No. 1.

The work before the citizens' committee is of great importance. America is believed to be the nation to take the initiative in calling the next peace conference, and the success of the international meeting depends in no small degree upon the work of the American committee.

Secretary of State Bryan will present to the committee his plans for the furtherance of the world-peace movement, and general matters likely to come before the conference at The Hague probably will be discussed. Among the important questions upon which the world conference is expected to take action are the exemption from capture of private property at sea, blockades, the destruction of neutral prize ships and other private property, and the codification of international maritime laws of combat.

The citizens' committee, which is to meet in the Hotel Astor, New York city, will prepare to call this world conference, and will appoint a delegation to confer with President Wilson. The appointment of Dr. Craighead is a distinct honor, not only to the president himself, but to the state which he represents. It constitutes a recognition of President Craighead's splendid work in general educational fields, and is a graceful compliment to Montana.
