MARKET MOVEMENT IS DOWNWARD A TRIFLE

FLUCTUATIONS ARE NOT LARGE, HOWEVER, AND THE NET CHANGES ARE SMALL.

New York, Feb. 10.—The stock market held fast today to the approximate level of prices which has prevailed for the last fortnight. The public following attracted by the recent advance appeared to have fallen away and efforts of professional operators to inaugurate decisive movements one way or the other were again ineffective. Today's movement was downward and on the decline some of the less active shares broke sharply. Fluctuations of the representative stocks, however, were not large and in the later session the market improved.

The improved tone of the later dealings was influenced by the United States Steel corporation's monthly figures of unfilled tonnage. The increase of 331,000 tons in unfilled orders was the first gain in more than a year. Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value, \$3,955,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Regulation Adopted by the Montana State Board of Horticulture, January 30, 1914.

For purpose of preventing the spread of contagious diseases or insect pests among fruit and fruit trees, in pursuance of an act to amend an act of horticulture by section 1922, of the revised codes of Montana, it is hereby declared and ordered that no fruit infested with San Jose Scale (Aspidiotus perniciosus), Pear Scale (Aspidiotus perniciosus), Pear Leaf Blister Mite (Eriophyes pyri), Codling Moth (Cydia pomonella), or any other dangerous insect hereafter discovered, or infested with Apple Scab (Venturia pomorum), Pear Scab (Venturia pyri), Pear Blight (Zaellius amylovorus), Powdery Mildew (Podosphaera oxycanthae), Bitter Rot (Glomerella rotundifolia), or any other dangerous disease hereafter discovered, shall be shipped from point of production, except for such purposes as may be permitted by an official horticultural inspector of the state, for the manufacture of cider or jellies, for exportation purposes, or for the manufacture of any other by-product, and the purpose for which said fruit is to be used shall be plainly marked upon the inspection certificate accompanying the shipment. 2-6 to 15.

Grain and Provisions

Chicago, Feb. 10.—Unexpected falling off in the world's available supply had a rallying effect today on wheat. Closing prices were strong at an advance of 3/8c to 1/2c net. Other speculative articles, too, all showed a gain—corn, 1/2c; oats, 1/4c to 3/8c; and provisions 7/8c to 20c @ 22 1/2c.

Such a huge decrease as 6,377,000 bushels in the world's stock of wheat would not but encourage the bulls, and the government snow map was also a disappointment to the bears—Kansas, southern Illinois and south and central Indiana being unprotected and the covering in Nebraska very light.

Corn bulged on account of receivers agreeing that country offerings were light.

The market was lower at first because of fine weather for shelling and hauling.

Oats had independent strength, the result of statements that most of the 2,796,000 bushels of Canadian oats at
