Regulation adopted by the Montana State Board of Horticulture, January 30, 1914.

For purpose of preventing the spread of contagious diseases or insect pests among fruit and nut trees, in pursuance of authority vested in the board of horticulture by section 1922, of the revised codes of Montana, it is hereby declared and ordered that no fruit infested with San Jose Scale (Aspidiotus perniciosus), Puntan Scale (Aspidiotus arbutus), Oyster Shell Scale (Podosaphes ulmi), Pear Leaf Blight (Mite (Glyptophyes pyri), Codling Mite (Cydia pomonella), or any other dangerous insect hereafter discovered, or infected with Apple Scab (Venturia pomorum), Pear Scab (Venturia pyrina), Pear Blight (Bacillus amylovorus), Powdery Mildew (Podosphaera oxycantana), Bitter Rot (Glomerella rotulaeformis), or any other dangerous disease hereafter discovered, shall be shipped from this state, for sale, except for such purposes as may be permitted by an official horticultural inspector of the state, for the manufacture of elder or jellies, for evaporation purposes, or for the manufacture of any other by-product, and the purpose for which said fruit is to be used shall be plainly marked upon the inspection certificate accompanying the shipment. 2-6 to 15.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC NOT AFFECTED BY SUIT

LITTLE ATTENTION PAID BY SPECULATORS AFTER GOVERNMENT TAKES ACTION.

New York, Feb. 11.—The level of stock market quotations was not altered appreciably by today's trading. Speculation lacked any suggestion of animation. With a holiday at hand professional traders were inclined to restrict their operations. The only event of the day on which a speculative movement might have been based was passed by almost unnoticed.

Southern Pacific was not affected by filing of the government's suit to compel it to relinquish control of Central Pacific. At the opening the stock moved off its heaviness being ascertained by Washington reports that the suit would be filed but fractional loss was recovered before word came of the action in court. Southern Pacific collateral bonds moved up strongly for a time, being purchased with the idea that should the government win its case Southern Pacific would be compelled to retire the bonds at par in order to free the Central Pacific stock, which is security for the bonds.

Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value, \$3,951,000. Panama 8s registered advanced 1/4 and the coupon 3/8 1/2 on call.

Corn weakened under an increase of country offerings and because of continued slowness of shipping demand.

Oats were depressed by the heaviness of corn and by incredulity about supposed export sales of Canadian oats at Buffalo.

In the provisions crowd, free selling by stockyard interests more than offset whatever bullishness might have resulted from an early advance in the price of hogs. Owners seemed to be especially determined to get rid of lard.
