COLORLESS SESSION MARKS DAY'S TRADING

MARKET IS LISTLESS AND MAKES BUT SLIGHT HEADWAY DESPITE LONDON'S BOOST.

New York, Feb. 13.—Today there was little by which the stock market could be distinguished from the colorless sessions which preceded it this week. The undertone was distinctly firm.

London again played an important part in this market, and such headway as was made was due largely to the foreign influence.

Known currency movements of the week suggested another strong bank statement. A gain in cash of \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000 was forecast.

While there were a few weak points in the bond market its tone in general was good. Total sales, par value, \$2,955,000.

United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Wheat Drops.

Chicago, Feb. 13.—Ample snow covering throughout the entire winter crop belt gave the wheat market a downturn today. Closing prices were heavy at 1/4 to 3/4 ¢ net decline.

Notwithstanding that export sales at Duluth this week were said to have amounted to more than 2,000,000 bushels, wheat prices here today could not be rallied in a way that was at all lasting. Assertions that a good foreign demand was in evidence at Kansas City or the seaboard were not verified.

Corn rose because of unsettled weather expected to curtail the movement to primary markets. Besides, the west reported a better feeding demand and there were advices of crop damage from hailstorms in Argentina, where shipments for the week fell off about 1,000,000 bushels compared with last week and with a year ago.

The strength in oats was for the most part a reflection from corn. Lower prices on hogs carried provisions down. After a decided break shorts bought freely to secure profits. Business Conditions.

New York, Feb. 13.—Den's Review will say tomorrow: Distribution of reasonable merchandise has been stimulated by zone temperatures which have accelerated the movement of heavy-weight apparel and fuel. Recent stormy weather also broadened the demand for footwear and the general business situation reflects gradual betterment.

It is significant that the leading interests in iron and steel reported a considerable gain in unfilled tonnage during January, following a year of continuous losses. This obviously means that the great basic industry is recovering from previous depression in spite of the fact that railroads still confine their purchases to the closest limits.

In the matter of prices, the general tendency is upward with producers' reluctance to contract for future business except at advances over former quotations.

Failures this week numbered 403 in the United States against 329 last year, and 51 in Canada compared with 33 a year ago.

PLEA FOR SMALL FEE BY GENERAL ELECTRIC

Helena, Feb. 13.—(Special.)—The General Electric company applied to the supreme court today for a writ of mandate to compel Secretary of State M. A. Anderson to file its charter and accept a fee of \$1 for doing so. The application, which has not been acted upon, recites he demanded a fee in excess of \$10,000, based on a percentage of the amount of capital stock.

Regulation Adopted by the Montana State Board of Horticulture, January 30, 1914.

For purpose of preventing the spread of contagious diseases or insect pests among fruit and fruit trees, in pursuance of authority vested in the board of horticulture by section 1922, of the revised codes of Montana, it is hereby declared and ordered that no fruit insect heretofore discovered, or infected with Apple Scab (Venturia pomii), Pear Scab (Venturia pyrina), Pear Blight (Bacillus amylovorus), Powdery Mildew (Podospheera oxycartha), Bitter Rot (Glomerella pomonulosa), or any other dangerous disease hereafter discovered, shall be shipped from point of production, except by such purposes as may be permitted by an official horticultural inspector of the state, for the manufacture of elder or jellies, for exportation purposes, or for the manufacture of any other by-product, and the purpose for which said fruit is to be used shall be plainly marked upon the inspection certificate accompanying the shipment. 2-8 to 15.
