## ON CONSOLIDATION VALLEY FOLKS DIVIDE

MEETING HELD AT CORVALLIS TO DISCUSS MERGER FOR FOUR OF THE COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Corvallis, Feb. 17.—(Special.)—The Presbyterian church was filled to its capacity on Monday evening when an enthusiastic mass meeting was held to consider the question of consolidating the Woodside, Mountain View and Willow Creek of the Corvallis schools. The principal feature of the evening's program was a convincing address on the consolidation question by Charles Kinney, deputy state superintendent, who is constantly engaged in consolidation work throughout Montana. Professor W. S. Bailey spoke briefly on the financial advantage of the union. The pupils of the public and high schools were heard in solos and songs, while the primary folks executed a pleasing drill. The high school band, under the leadership of Professor Bailey, made its first public appearance, and acquitted itself with honor. From Corvallis, Superintendent Charles Kinney will visit in turn the Willow Creek, Woodside and Mountain View districts, at mass meetings to discuss consolidation.

The consolidation of the four schools will necessitate the erection of a new school building here. The majority of the Corvallis people are in favor of the union and most of the opposition comes from the three smaller districts. It is generally conceded, however, that within a few years, at least, consolidation will take place, as Bitter Root people become more interested in educational matters.

NEW HEAD OF CABINET.

Mexico City, Feb. 17.—Jose Lopez Portillo y Rojas became head of President Huerta's cabinet today when Querido Mohano was transferred from the department of foreign affairs to that of commerce and labor. Senor Portillo has been minister of instruction and governor of the state of Jalisco.

## BOTH SIDES SCORED BY OKLAHOMA LAWYERS

DENUNCIATION AND INVECTIVE FEATURE ARGUMENTS MADE IN THE GORE CASE.

Oklahoma City, Feb. 17.—Six of the 12 hours allotted for argument in the damage suit brought by Mrs. Minnie E. Bond of Oklahoma City against United States Senator Thomas P. Gore, had been consumed when court adjourned today and unless some unforeseen contingency arises the case will be submitted to the jury tomorrow.

Two attorneys spoke today for the plaintiff and one for the defense. Neither spared the parties to suit. Senator Gore and Mrs. Bond, as well as those characterized by Washington as "disgraced politicians whose pleadings for me were unanswerable," and who, the defense charges, engineered the suit, were scored.

Summing up began after Judge Clark read his instructions to the jury at the opening of court, counsel for Mrs. Bond having announced they would not present additional testimony in rebuttal. It was understood that at least three witnesses would be called today, among them James B. Jacobs, in whose room at a Washington hotel the alleged attack on which Mrs. Bond bases her suit is said to have occurred last March.

E. J. Giddings, attorney for the plaintiff, who opened the argument, declared the contention of the defense that the senator had been made the victim of a conspiracy was without foundation.

"Why, after nine months, has no effort been made to have the alleged conspirators arrested?" he asked the jury.

Turning from the jury and pointing first to Mrs. Gore and then to Mrs. Bond, Giddings exclaimed: "Look at these two women and note the difference in them. One is garbed in rich garments, the other is a plain woman, the daughter of a simple farmer. There sit her parents, plain honest people from the farm. Such people do not frame up conspiracies."

## ROCK ISLAND PROBE IS NOW SUGGESTED

Washington, Feb. 17.—Another railroad finance investigation was proposed in the house today by Representative Green of Iowa, who introduced a resolution requesting the interstate commerce commission to inquire into the financial operations of the holding companies controlling the Rock Island railroad. The resolution requests information as to the financial operations by which the Rock Island holding companies were financed, as to the money since expended in improvements, results obtained and as to the interests of men connected with the companies in property sold to the railroad.

The resolution was referred to the interstate and foreign commerce committee, which will open hearings tomorrow on the proposal to give the interstate commerce commission authority to supervise railroad securities.

## BIG BUNCH OF WATER DAMAGES A STEAMER

ON BELIEF.

Boston, Feb. 17.—How a huge sea which boarded the German steamer Wartenfels wrecked the chart house, smashed a powerful electric signal lamp, short circuited the wires and for a time charged the ship with electricity, was related today by Captain Schley when the steamer arrived from Calcutta.

Chief Officer Voight was thrown from the bridge and a beam from the demurrage chart house pinned the quartermaster to the deck.

The vessel was rolling heavily and a human chain was formed to pull away the beam. When the end man of the chain took hold of a steel stanchion he and all the others were knocked down by an electric shock.

## DENVER VOTERS DECIDE FOR MUNICIPAL WATER

Denver, Feb. 17.—By a vote of two to one, the taxing electors of this city today decided to proceed with the sale of \$8,000,000 of city bonds and with the proceeds construct a municipal water plant.

A plan of the retail association to submit the appraisal of the Denver Union Water company, now supplying

the city on sufferance, to the arbitration of nine arbitrators with a maximum price of \$14,400,000 was rejected.

The taxpayers electors also, by a vote of approximately 3 to 1, voted to issue \$2,000,000 city bonds for the construction of the tunnel through James Peak to provide a short cut to Salt Lake city for the use of the Denver & Salt Lake railroad mainly, but for the use of all other lines. The Denver & Salt Lake management guaranteed the interest on bonds which are to extend over 60 years. The defeat of the retail association plan, which was acceptable to the water company, leaves that corporation an

outlaw in the streets, its franchise having expired in 1910, and with \$11,000,000 bonds due in July on a capitalization of \$7,500,000 and no funds to meet the payments.
