LOOKING UP "It's always morning somewhere."

It's a good sign that Andrew Carnegie keeps up his donations to the cause of peace. A very large chunk of the Carnegie millions came from the manufacture of armor plate and cannons and it is a fine thing to have some of that money turned into the fund which will make that sort of steel stuff useless.

That is a long look ahead and a far look upward, but it will come one of these days. Arbitration is not impossible nor is it as impracticable as a good many folks think.

How veritably war is hell is shown in the disclosures which are following the fighting in the Balkan region.

The devastation of a beautiful country, the slaughter of its women and children, the slaying of its men and boys—these are the pictures of war which we are getting from the Balkan region these days and they leave no room for wonder that the world is weary of these conflicts.

We laugh at the talk of universal peace. We ridicule the persistence of Mr. Carnegie. We decry the possibility of there being any world-wide peace establishment. But the realization of these plans is not as far off as might be.

WHY NOT "MULLAN" COUNTY?

It was suggested in The Missoulian yesterday that the people of the west-end district, who are planning to set up a county government of their own, have an opportunity to honor the memory of a man who was one of the notable figures in the early history of this region.

For many reasons, it would be specially fitting to name the new county in honor of Lieutenant Mullan. He was the pioneer roadbuilder of this region; he engineered the first overland trail successfully; the best of his work was done in the very territory which it is proposed to include in the new county.

It does not seem to us that anybody in the new county will question the appropriateness of conferring the name "Mullan" upon the new corporate organization. Every consideration of the subject must carry conviction of the fitness of such action.

In their statement of their case, the advocates of the new-county movement have said that they hope, by building good roads and inviting inspection of their advantages, to attract a farming population which will rapidly increase their prosperity.

So, from all viewpoints, the name "Mullan" appeals to us as singularly appropriate for Missoula's newest daughter. We hope the suggestion will appeal to the people who are in the movement, so they will take steps to revise their action in the matter of choosing a name.

Associated with the counties which have been formed from old Missoula county are the names of Ravalli, of Sanders and of Lincoln. Another bears the tribal name of the Indians who were once the lords of this domain.

We do not make this suggestion in a meddlesome spirit. The naming of a daughter of Missoula is an affair in which all of us have concern. The name "Mullan" would suggest bubbly, bottled water.
