

SCRAMBLE IS TODAY FOR BALL STARS

ORGANIZED AND OUTLAW LEAGUE MAGNATES WILL MEET TOURISTS ON ARRIVAL.

New York, March 5.—Men from-ment in organized baseball, as well as a large group of Federal leaguers, arrived today to welcome the world-touring ball players who will arrive tomorrow on the Lusitania. Plans have been made to greet the much-traveled ball tossers at quarantine, which the liner is expected to leave in time to dock by 9 o'clock in the morning.

Besides the welcome to the tourists, which in its main feature will take the form of a banquet Saturday night, the time of the magnates in organized baseball is expected to be well occupied by conferences over the situation created by the advent of the Federals. The latter have a particular interest in the homecoming of the Giants and White Sox because of their desire to obtain the signatures of some of the returning players to Federal league contracts.

President Dan Johnson of the American league came into the city on the same train today with James A. Gilmore, president of the Federal or organization. Tonight President John K. Tener of the National league was among the arrivals. The national commission trio was completed by the arrival of President August Herrmann of the Cincinnati club. Heads of other clubs also reached here with a number of minor league representatives.

The Chicago friends of President Comiskey, 86 in number, also arrived and have chartered the steamer Niagara to meet the Lusitania at quarantine.

The magnates will go down to meet the Lusitania on the government revenue cutter. At a late hour President Gilmore and his associates had been unable to get tickets to the cutter. There was some talk of chartering a boat, but as this would not give the Federals admission to the Lusitania, they were said to have about decided to meet the players at the dock, which

Hamilton, March 5.—(Special.)—County Assessor F. B. Tanner and his force of deputies, Hans DeYoung, C. M. Mr. Tanner stated this morning that his force would be ready to take the field in about ten days or by March 15. There is one more deputy to be appointed but the assessor was unable to state today who he would be.

SCHOOLS IN VALLEY TO BE JOINED PERHAPS

RESIDENTS IN TWO DISTRICTS PETITION FOR JOINTLY-OWNED BUILDING.

Hamilton, March 5.—(Special.)—The question of consolidating the Fairplay and Willow creek districts with the Corvallis school district will be voted on at special elections in the Corvallis and Willow Creek districts March 14, and in the Fairplay district March 15, according to an order issued this week of Miss Nora L. Smithy, county superintendent of schools. The order of the county superintendent came as the result of petitions from the three districts filed this week with the superintendent, asking that the elections be ordered. Miss Smithy stated this morning that all of the petitions were generally signed, showing practically no opposition to consolidation in the Willow Creek district, and but little in the Fairplay district. It is thought that many more signers could have been obtained in the Corvallis district but that those who circulated the petition were satisfied with the signatures of a majority of the patrons.

If the consolidation of the three districts is approved, a new schoolhouse will undoubtedly be erected at Corvallis, probably at the western edge of the town. Three wagons will be necessary to transport the pupils of the Fairplay district, one in the Willow Creek district, while one wagon will be necessary in the present Corvallis district owing to its elongated shape.

FOR SEVENTH TIME ARRESTED

HEAD OF BANKING ASSOCIATION JAILED SEVEN TIMES IN ONE WEEK.

Chicago, March 5.—John W. Worthington, head of the defunct American Banking association, who had been charged with many irregularities, was arrested tonight for the seventh time in as many days. As the banker stopped from the detective bureau where he obtained release on \$5,000 bond, he was arrested by a United States deputy marshal and served with a warrant charging him with using the mails to defraud.


