Socialism Discussed

Fellow Citizens of Missoula:—At the approach of election day, I feel it my duty to take up my pen and in an humble manner, endeavor to stay the tide of insanity which seems to have a grip on some simple-minded, honest-intentioned, earnest-endavoring, misguided voters of Missoula, who in this time of impending peril, seem unconsciously slumbering, unthinkingly heedless and indifferent to a crisis at hand, which to my mind is unquestionably as vital and important to each and every one of us as any proposition ever presented to the electorate of Missoula to decide.

On Monday next we will elect a mayor and a commissioner. We must decide who will hold these important offices for the next two years. The choice is not between opposing candidates as men; not whether Mr. Higgins, our friend, or Mr. Getchell, our neighbor, will be our next mayor; Mr. Price or Mr. Hodson, our new commissioner, but whether we shall choose to be governed by socialists, avowed partisans and advocates of the socialist doctrine; whether we will encourage and endorse a propaganda for an impossible Utopia, of which Samuel Gompers says:

"I have studied your philosophy; read your economics and not the meanness of them; studied your standard works, both in English and German; have not only read them, but studied them. I have heard your orators and watched the work of your movement the world over. I have kept close watch on your doctrines for 30 years; have been closely associated with many of you and know how you think and what you propose. I know what you have up your sleeve. And I want to say to you that I am entirely at variance with your philosophy. Economically you are unsound, socially you are wrong, industrially you are an impossibility."

To me Missoula is my home; I love her clean broad streets; her beautiful homes and gardens; her every environment, which makes for peace and contentment. I aspire to bring up my family here in "God's own country," endowed with every condition that makes for honesty, constant purpose, intelligence and a Christian spirit, molding true and faithful citizens of this great republic.

I know no east nor west; no north nor south; with factions or cliques I have no part; my heart is for Missoula, first, last and all the time; so let it be understood these comments are prompted for no reason other than to express my views and expound the truths as God gives me the wisdom to see them.

Mr. Higgins and Mr. Price, I know but casually, nodding to them when I see them about town; of their character as men I here only comment of praise; of their past work in office, only meritorious commendations.

Mr. Getchell and Mr. Hodson, I know only by sight and reputation; of them I hear only words of praise as gentlemen of honor, faithfulness and integrity; therefore, I wish in no manner here or hereafter to reflect on their worth as men among men.

This correspondence is written on a question of principle, of belief in our system of administering justice and legislation; for the honor of our Flag and Country; the support of a Christian belief in the salvation of mankind and the perpetuation of our nation as we know it and love it.

I appeal to the common sense and reason of my neighbors to rid us of a blight which would bring about strife, dissatisfaction and business calamity, just as I appeal to the orchardist to spray his fruit to rid it of disease.

Socialism, like a canker, eats its way to the heart of regulated society, spreading discontent and unrest, tearing down democracy and independence, leaving in its wake chaos instead of peace wherever its ravages penetrate.

Socialism is not a movement inaugurated by a few unhappy, unfortunate, dissatisfied persons in our midst, who espouse it for local social reform; it is not a panacea for our present business depression; it is not a friendly spurge of brotherly love to lift our city out of debt—it is a particular species of modern error; of international extent grounded on the theories propounded by authors and disciples of international reputation. In emphasizing the importance, then, of considering how you shall cast your vote next Monday, I shall endeavor to provide a clear and forcible presentation of socialism—what it stands for. In doing so, I shall be careful to attribute to socialism no doctrine which its chief scientific and accredited leaders and exponents have not again and again claimed to be their own.

I shall endeavor to show in a concise manner the incongruity of electing a socialist to office in Missoula, with its Christian law-abiding citizenship; how inconsistent it would be to expect a socialist in office to serve two masters. The more honest, faithful and good the man, the more subservient he will be to his party, his platform and doctrine or socialism. Unconsciously he will be a tool to his own initiative. He cannot be a socialist and deny the fundamental tenets of socialism.

Can a socialist be a Christian or is it possible to have a Christian socialist? He cannot, gentlemen. I will quote my authority.

Fredrick Engels, the high priest of socialism says: "Three great obstacles block the path of social reform—private property, religion and the present form of marriage." In other words, private property, religion and marriage must be abolished before socialism can be established, and yet we know that those three institutions are the bulwarks of Christian civilization the world over.—(Basic Principles of Socialism.—Jefferson Lee in The Common Cause.)

Karl Marx, the Moses of the American socialist, says: "Religion is a fantastic degradation of human nature."

George D. Herron, a prominent American socialist, wrote these words a few years ago: "Christianity today stands for what is lowest and basest in life. The church of today sounds the lowest note of human life. It is the most degrading of all our institutions and the most brutalizing in its effects on the common life."

Behel, one of the canonized saints of socialism, exclaims: "Leave Heaven to the angels and the sparrows."

Liebknecht says: "Socialism must conquer the stupidity of the masses insofar as this stupidity reveals itself in religious forms and dogmas."

Blatchford in "God and My Neighbor" says: "I am an earnest old pagan and I am not angry with you at all—you funny little champions of the Most High."

"The High, the God of Heaven? This, the Father of Christ? This, the Creator of the Milky Way? No! He will not do. He is not big enough. He is not good enough. He is not clean enough. He is a spiritual nightmare—a bad dream born in savage minds of terror and ignorance and a tigerish lust for blood."
