Hot Springs, Ark., April 1.—Barney Dreyfuss, president of the Pittsburgh National league club, arrived here tonight accompanied by Ellis G. Knicker, an attorney, to present documentary evidence tomorrow in support of injunction proceedings against Federal league agents and against their counter-charge that organized baseball is a trust and its contracts illegal.
