

SPECULATION SLOW WITH VALUES UNCHANGED

NOT EVEN AN ENTHUSIASTIC GRAIN REPORT CAN RAISE MARKET FROM SLUMBER

New York, April 7.—Speculation was again slow today and market values were little changed. Even the brilliant promise held out for the winter wheat crop in the government report failed to arouse the market from its lethargy.

Renewed liquidation in low-priced shares, particularly those involved in reorganization proceedings held back the general market. Both Washab issues and St. Louis & San Francisco common and second preferred made new low records.

The bond market was irregular. St. Louis & San Francisco refunding 4s advanced sharply despite the weakness of the stocks. Total sales, \$1,850,000.

United States 2s registered declined 1/8 on call.

SPANIARDS SUFFER FROM VILLA EDICT

Exile of Dons From Cities Captured by the Rebels Will Become an International Question of Importance but Carranza Says the Order Must Stand.

Washington, April 7.—Vigorous representations went from the American government today to General Carranza, the constitutionalist chief, urging that he modify the order of General Villa expelling Spaniards from Torreon.

The United States has undertaken to extend to Spaniards in Mexico the same protection it affords American residents there, and Ambassador Bland has been assured that nothing will be left undone to assure the unfortunate Spaniards every right to which they are entitled under international law and usage.

That Spain proposes to exhaust every resource to protect her people in Mexico, was made plain today when Rear Admiral Mayo at Tampico cabled the navy department that the commanding officer of the British cruiser Hermonie had been instructed to call for Spaniards at this besieged frontier port.

The state department as well as the Spanish embassy here is embarrassed in dealing with the situation at Torreon by a lack of exact information as to the extent of the decree of expulsion and how far it has been executed.

The gravity of the problem has been increased by information that this policy of expulsion of Spaniards is to be of general application; that as rapidly as the constitutionalists extend their control over such cities as Saltillo and Monterey and other places now within the federal lines, they intend to drive out the Spaniards and seize their property.

It has also been pointed out that Villa's decree involves the confiscation of the property of the Torreon Spaniards, it is wholly illegal, for even conceding the right of expulsion of aliens under certain circumstances, international law expressly provides that this shall be done humanely and without inflicting loss upon the subjects.

There are 700 Spanish men, women and children in Torreon itself. There is no Spanish consul in Torreon at the present time and the affairs of the colony are being cared for by the Italian, American and British consuls.

Rebels Unshaken.

Juarez, Mexico, April 7.—Despite expressions of Washington's unofficial displeasure at the expulsion of the Spanish colony from Torreon, the purpose of the rebel leaders in this regard was unshaken today.

Rich Holdings.

El Paso, Texas, April 7.—When George C. Carothers, special agent of the department of state, returned to this side from his conference with General Carranza this afternoon, he locked himself up in his office, saying that he had reports to make.

Grave Problem.

The large colony of Spanish refugees in El Paso were deeply dependent over the situation. They are convinced that their properties accumulated during a lifetime of work will be confiscated and themselves deprived of their homes.

Carranza on the Spanish question today. The big American in his gray business suit rested from his recent experiences at the battle of Torreon and the equally big first chief of the revolution was plainly visible in the latter's office by visitors who waited in the corridor of the customs house here.

Their heads were close together for half an hour. When Carothers emerged he was besieged by anxious inquirers as to the status of the incident, but he rushed to his automobile without answering questions, shaking his head negatively.

Carranza Stands Pat.

The purpose of the conference transpired this afternoon, however, through sources that hitherto have proved reliable. It was said that Carothers informed Carranza that the summary expulsion of the Spaniards was viewed very gravely at Madrid and without favor at Washington.

Spaniards Despondent.

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General Carranza says that you may return if investigation shows that you have kept out of politics, said a would-be comforter to a Spanish merchant who fled from Chihuahua three months ago.

Yes, after our property has been stolen we may return and build up another little fortune for some revolutionists to confiscate. No, thanks, the merchant answered bitterly. Oh, if Spain were only strong this could not happen, but Spain is poor. She has no ships and but little money.

In addition to the Torreon interests the Spaniards own large haciendas in the cotton district of Laguna, and the irrigated alfalfa farms. The nominal Spanish population of Torreon is estimated to be 5,000, but it has been reduced since the start of the revolution to 1,000, including the Spanish residents of the Laguna district.

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
