



IT'S ALL QUIET AT VERA CRUZ REFUGEES ARE POURING IN

Vera Cruz, April 25.—The most drastic treatment possible will be administered to Mexican snipers caught operating at night. At a staff conference today the question of this kind of shooting was discussed and it was decided that the most severe measures would be the only simple and quick solution.

Lieutenant Colonel Kane, commanding 500 marines with two hydro-aeroplanes, was ordered today to advance to the source of the water supply at Tejeria, nine miles up the river. The supply has been shut off and it is reported that General Mas's men have been seeking to damage the pumps.

The water supply here, however, is adequate for all purposes, and there is little danger from contamination. It is probable that navy aeroplanes will scout in advance of the train bearing the marines.

A scouting squad advanced two miles inland today and endeavored to repair the telegraph lines to Mexico City. The scouts encountered hundreds of Mexicans coming from miles around. They carried baskets and expected to obtain food from the Americans. A rumor had gone out that the American forces were feeding everybody who applied, and hundreds turned about headquarters this morning.

Three aeroplanes arrived on the battleship Mississippi today. The Mississippi came from Pensacola with 600 marines. A special train carrying refugees from the capital tonight from Mexico City. The refugees report the continued destruction of American property there.

Up to the time of their departure no Americans had been killed. The Americans, of whom there were 18 on the train, were smuggled through under assumed names. The train carried about 300 persons, for the most part British and German.

Among them were Robert Phillips and family, one of whom, an infant, was suffering from smallpox. The refugees were held at the station in the capital for 12 hours before the train was permitted to leave. A persistent search had been made for Americans. While an order has been issued against the further departure of Americans from Mexico City, it is believed the permission granted by the American commander to the family of General Gustavo Mas to leave Vera Cruz may have the effect of causing the withdrawal of this order.

General Mas is a relative of Huerta.

REFUGEES THROUG EL PASO'S HOTELS

El Paso, Texas, April 25.—A hundred more refugees came out of Mexico today and the hotels and rooming houses are crowded with them. In a week or 10 days, it is said, their maintenance will become a serious question. Today General Villa reiterated his statements with reference to the American occupation of Vera Cruz.

While the military leader of the revolution was giving expression to such utterances to visitors from time to time, the Carranza Junta here was busy explaining that Carranza, while not hostile, was correct in resenting the seizure as an affront to the Mexican nation.

General Villa, when told tonight of the acceptance by the United States of the proposition made by Argentina, Brazil and Chile to arbitrate the differences between the United States and Mexico, said he hoped Huerta also would accept and clearing up the international feature of the embargo, leaving the people of Mexico to settle their own troubles.

"The revolution then may be prosecuted without fear of international entanglements," he said.

Washington, April 24.—(Special.)—W. W. Humphrey of Twin Falls, Idaho, is asking for a congressional investigation of the interior department in connection with the lease recently granted F. J. Haynes, for transportation and freight rates over the Florida route into the Yellowstone national park.

Mr. Humphrey was an applicant for the lease and claims that his offer to transport passengers and freight provided for lower rates than those the government is permitting Haynes to charge. Humphrey says his bid was as follows: Twenty-five cents per capita on passengers; \$40 an acre for land used for buildings, pastures, etc.; \$7,500 per annum rent, and a reduction of 20 per cent on passenger rates. The lease was granted, it is asserted by Humphrey, for \$2,500 rental, \$10 per acre for land and no per capita tax to be paid.

Mr. Humphrey has submitted his request for a congressional investigation to members of the senate in the shape of a printed pamphlet in which he says he cannot understand why his application and proposal, which were so much more favorable to the government, and other applications quite as favorable, if not more so than that of Haynes, should all have been rejected without giving any reason therefor. He asserts that the matter warrants a congressional investigation and requests the members of the senate to have such investigation made.

HUMPHREY OBJECTS TO CONTRACT AWARD

BIDDER FOR PORK PRIVILEGE ASKS FOR AN INVESTIGATION.

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SNOWSTORM DRIVING A MISSOULA TUNNEL

MINING COMPANY STARTS DEVELOPMENT WORK ON ITS OWN PROPERTY.

Mullan, April 24.—(Special.)—The Snowstorm company at Mullan has started active work in driving the long tunnel from the Snowstorm workings into Missoula ground. The tunnel starts on the No. 4, or deepest level of the Snowstorm tunnel workings and when completed will be over 8,000 feet in length, and will take close to three years to finish under favorable conditions.

The actual work of driving this tunnel has been started is important to the entire copper belt, as it will pass directly along the belt for the entire length of the tunnel, passing through groups owned by the Snowshoe company and Lucky Calumet company. The work will probably follow the footwall fissure of the Snowstorm vein as far west as possible.

Where the work has been started there is an important discovery of low grade ore in the Ravett quartzite. The entire belt, so far as opened in the Snowstorm, National and Missoula copper properties is a mass of mineralized quartzite, carrying from one-half to one per cent copper far outside of the pay portions of the veins. The ore is apparently enriched in main channels following the footwall fissures, gradually fading into lower grades towards the hanging wall side until it becomes unprofitable to mine.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Missoula company, held at Mullan on the evening of Saturday, April 18, about 700,000 shares of the stock was represented, and it was agreed by those present that this amount of stock be placed in the pool for a term of two years under the agreement bonding the property to the Snowstorm, which bond calls for \$500,000, \$100,000 in two years and the balance at the rate of \$100,000 every six months thereafter until the full amount is paid. This arrangement being satisfactory to the Snowstorm company, the deal was declared closed.


