FREE TRADE HURTS AMERICAN BUSINESS

RECORD OF IMPORTS SHOWS OUR INDUSTRIES TO BE HARD HIT.

Washington, D. C., April 29.—(Special)—Imports of staple products into the United States are increasing with rapidity and with corresponding injury to certain home industries.

Under the new tariff foreign producers and manufacturers operating under a lower cost of production, are shipping large quantities of pig iron into the United States. The wages of thousands of employes either have been reduced or will be reduced, as part of the effort to meet the situation. According to a report made by John A. Penton of Cleveland, secretary of the American Pig Iron association, the pig iron industry in the United States is being operated at a loss of \$1,000,000 a month. The average loss per ton on all pig iron sold by 85 per cent of the manufacturers and merchants north of the Ohio River during February was \$1.15 per ton. Many furnaces have been shut down and a number of the best plants are in the hands of receivers.

Wool imports from Australia into the United States are increasing at such a rate as to eventually disturb domestic prices. A recent consular report shows that exports of wool from the port of Sydney to the United States during 1913 reached the total of \$714,345. In 1913 the first quarter showed \$22,488, the second \$7,952, the third \$39,473, and the fourth \$97,691. During the whole of the 1912-13 wool season (July 1 to June 30), 4,357 bales of wool were exported to the United States from Sydney. To the date of writing (Feb. 9, 1914), since July 1, 1913, 20,088 bales were shipped.
