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LOYOLA HIGH TEAM BEATS MISSION TOSSERS

MISSOULA BASEBALL CLUB WINS DECISIVE VICTORY FROM ST. IGNATIUS.

The fast Loyola high school baseball team of this city, unbeaten, though contenders against the fastest amateur and semi-professional teams of western Montana, won a decisive victory from the Mission team of St. Ignatius yesterday afternoon.

Belton, the Missoula team's crack pitcher, allowed the reservation hitters only four scattered hits, two of them scratches. His support was ragged in critical spots or he would have shut out the Mission nine.

The Missoula team batted three pitchers all over the field. During the early innings the game gave promise of developing into a great contest, but in the fifth the Missoula boys got to Micheau, the Mission slabster, and slammed out a half dozen hits for nine runs before the rally could be stopped.

With the game sewed up, Missoula's attack eased up, though Peon and J. Dishman, succeeding hurlers, were slammed in merry fashion.

For Loyola, Theriault played his usual strong and heady game, coming through in the fifth with a two-base hit that cleaned the sacks and opened the slaughter that culminated in the removal of Micheau. Dan Maloney of Loyola made the sensational catch of the day when he ran in from deep center and grabbed a hard hit drive just back of second base.

G. K. Carlson et al., sections 8 and 9, township 21 north, range 21 west.

David Boyd et al., road running from the southwest corner section 34, township 21 north, range 21 west, to the north line of Missoula county from the township line north four and one-half miles, and that the county surveyor be instructed to take up with the state land agent the proposition for water road running east and west through section 16.

J. R. Smoek et al., a road running from the northwest corner of section 16, range 19 north, range 20 west, on the section line, four miles to the McDonald crossing on Post creek, and the road now traveled be declared the public highway.

Walter A. Cross et al., a road around and in the vicinity of section 19, township 19 north, range 21 west.

Percy Bowers et al., a road commencing at the southwest corner of section 8, township 19 north, range 19 west and running north two miles, and that the county surveyor be instructed to file the necessary plats with the Indian department for the obtaining of a right-of-way if the right-of-way can be procured without cost to the county.

C. Vanderburg et al., a road running east and west through the center of section 10, township 21 north, range 20 west, through the west half of the section; that the remainder be declared the public highway as soon as the right-of-way over the Indian allotments is arranged for.

Robert Johnson et al., a road to run from the boundary line of Sanders and Missoula counties on the south line of section 33 to a point on the east line of section 27, township 19 north, range 21 west, along the north as surveyed by the county surveyor.

P. J. Alexander et al., a road on the township line between townships 18 and 19 north, to run from the St. Ignatius and Roman road to connect with lower Post creek crossing, provided the county can obtain right-of-way over the Indian allotments crossed. The county surveyor be instructed to prepare the necessary plats to file with the Indian department.

Schuyler Harris et al., a road to run on the township line due east from Roman to a point on the east side of the high canal of the United States reclamation service on condition that the county is able to obtain the right-of-way over the Indian allotments crossed, and the county surveyor be instructed to prepare plats of same.

Sirs—We, Frank Nelson and James Bonner, acting road viewers, have the honor to report that we have viewed the routes of the proposed roads on the Flathead Indian reservation, and have the following report to make on each:

G. K. Carlson et al., in sections 8 and 9, township 21 north, range 21 west, recommend that the petition be granted David Boyd et al., for a road running from the southwest corner of section 34, township 21 north, range 21 west, to the north line of Missoula county; we recommend that the petition be granted from the township line north four and one-half miles, and that the county surveyor be instructed to take up with the state land agent the proposition for a water road running east and west through section 16.

J. R. Smoek et al., running from the northeast corner of section 16, township 19 north, range 20 west, on the section line, four miles to the McDonald crossing of Post creek; we recommend that the petition be granted and the road now traveled be declared a public highway. Walter A. Cross et al., for a road around and in the vicinity of section 19, township 19 north, range 21 west; we recommend that the petition be granted on condition that the county is able to obtain the right-of-way over the Indian allotments crossed, and the county surveyor be instructed to prepare plats of same.

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Sale of Non-Competent and Inherited Indian Lands

Department of the Interior, United States Indian Service, Flathead Indian Agency, Jocko, Montana, March 19, 1914.

Bids for the lands listed below will be opened at the Flathead Indian Agency, Jocko, Montana, at 1:30 p. m., May 21, 1914. Each bid must be accompanied by certified check on some solvent bank, payable to order of Fred C. Morgan, Supt. and S. D. A., for not less than 30 per cent of amount of bid. If bid is accepted balance of amount of bid must be paid within 80 days from acceptance. If successful bidder shall fail to comply with terms of bid or fail to make payment of balance of amount of bid within 20 days after due date, check for 10 per cent of amount of bid accepted by him shall be forfeited to use of officer of the land, less cost of advertising, etc. Each bid must be enclosed in a sealed envelope, and must be marked by the bidder "Bid for Indian Land." The date of opening bids shall be stated but description of the land must not be noted on the envelope. No bidder shall be permitted to include more than one allotment in any bid. If a prospective purchaser desires to bid on more than one allotment he must submit a separate bid for each allotment he desires to purchase. Sale number as shown in left-hand margin of list can be given in the bid.

"After sealed bids are opened the lands not sold will be offered for sale at public auction at the agency office at Jocko, Montana, on May 21, 1914, at 10 a. m. Bids to be considered at less than appraised price, with exception of sealed bids the regular rules as to sale of land will govern the auction sale."
