

KIDDIES ARE SHOWN EDUCATIONAL FILMS

MISSOULA SCHOOL CHILDREN SEE REMARKABLE PICTURES OF WILD ANIMALS.

City school children in two installments, each large enough to fill the theater to the doors, attended the Empress theater yesterday afternoon and saw one of the most remarkable films ever exhibited in Missoula.

The pictures were admirable illustrations of the possibility of making the cinematograph serve as a practical educator. Wonderful from a technical standpoint, the films gave glimpses as well as children a remarkable glimpse of the habits and natural behavior of wild animals.

Hunting with a camera has been a popular method of research into the lives of animals for a good many years, but the most successful single exposure seems a sham beside these living, moving representations.

Animals of all species, of all climes are shown in their natural haunts. The picture represents an amazing amount of labor and patience. One of the pictures, for instance, reveals the life of the wild moor-hen, as only months of expert, painful, steady observation else could.

There were, also, surprisingly intimate pictures of snakes, birds, insects, carnivorous animals. Peeps into the history of wild animals which would be impossible to the most expert observer are given by the tele-photo eye of the camera.

The film is worthy of anyone's study. What it shows can hardly be seen by any student. Undoubtedly it is but the forerunner of films of educational value which will illuminate and broaden the studies of school children.

The two great audiences that saw the picture yesterday laughed and gaped in alternate delight and wonderment. They had placed before them the intimate history of tiny insects and great birds, of little domestic and the king of all beasts. The sight of those pictures must have been a great experience to these children; it shouldn't have been missed by anyone.

MOVIE MAN BUSY.



This success induced her to come to America, where her popularity was renewed at Hammerstein's. All of the London dramatic reviewers greeted her with unstinted praise.

This will be the only opportunity to see Mrs. Thaw in this city, for after a brief tour of the United States and Canada she returns to Europe to fulfill contracts calling for her appearance for several years in continental theaters.

PERMANENT HOME FOR SALVATION ARMY

CAMPAIGN FOR FUNDS A SUCCESS AND DEAL FOR BUILDING WILL BE CLOSED.

Captain Bryant of the Salvation Army reported splendid progress in his building campaign last evening. The active soliciting for money with which to purchase a permanent home—the old Stockholm saloon on West Front street is the building selected—commenced on May 1. Up to last night the results of the campaign had been \$2,800. This Captain Bryant considers a very encouraging showing for four days of work. He stated that he was gratified at the interest that has been shown in the proposition to furnish the Army with a home of its own and that very few of those whom he had called upon had refused to support the enterprise.

Home Is Assured.

"You can say that the home is now assured," said Captain Bryant last night. The captain was very happy over the outcome as this permanent home for his organization has been one of his dreams since he came to Missoula, realizing that with such a

home the scope of the work of the Army could be materially broadened.

"We expect to close the deal now in a few days and will take possession of the building. If the campaign for funds does not provide an amount sufficient to pay the whole of the purchase price, we will be compelled to carry a mortgage. But we hope to secure enough right now to put us in the clear.

"We will have a big celebration at the close of the campaign. I have asked for the Salvation Army band of Butte and think this organization can be secured to furnish the music for that celebration at the Missoula theater when we marry off our friend 'Louie.' That will be a great wedding and one which everybody will desire to witness."
