CO-OPERATIVE STORES FOR OXFORD STUDENTS

(By Associated Press Cable)

London, May 4.—Stores on purely co-operative lines, managed by members of Oxford university, are to be opened next term in Oxford. They will be run on similar lines to the Co-operative society at Dublin university last October, and which has proved a great success.

Sir Horace Plunkett, who has worked so hard for the principle of co-operation among the agriculturists and others of Ireland, and Lord Shaftesbury, are giving the movement their support. Management of the stores, however, will be in the hands of five senior and 20 junior members of the university. The principal burden of executive work will rest with the undergraduates themselves, from whom the idea springs. As at Dublin the stores will begin by stocking groceries, tobacco and similar commodities. The ambition of these responsible for the scheme is, first of all, to teach the main principles of co-operation by practical experience of its advantages. Principal among these will be less expensive goods and the distribution of profits among those who support the stores.

It is hoped that the stores will deal a blow to the credit system in vogue at the universities, which is a distinct temptation to members to run up heavy bills out of all proportion to their allowances.

SUCCESSFUL TEACHER ASSISTS INDIVIDUAL

St. Paul, May 4.—The days when a pupil in the public schools was only one of a class and the individual needs of each child were overlooked, have passed and today the successful teacher is the one who most nearly recognizes and supplies the needs of each child. At the great annual meeting of the National Education association in St. Paul, July 4 to 11, much of the time of the department of elementary education, meeting jointly with the department of school patrons, will be devoted to a discussion of how best to reach the individual pupil. One session will be devoted to "The School Life of the Child" and papers will be read on these subjects: "Self Expression in the School"; "A second session will be devoted to "The Home Life of the Child" with papers on these subjects: "Self Expression in Society"; "Self Protection Through Knowledge and Habit" and "Constructive Civic Agencies." These sessions will be of particular interest to the parents' association membership in the association, which includes admission to all the sessions of the association and its branches, and a bound copy of all the proceedings costs but \$2 a year.

AIMS OF EDUCATION TO BE SOUGHT FOR

St. Paul, May 4.—"The Principles and Aims of Education," will be one of the important subjects to be discussed at one of the general meetings of the National Education association at its annual convention here, July 4 to 11. "In our enthusiasm for all the new forms of education, which have taken our thought in recent years," says Joseph Swain, president of Swathmore college and president of the N. E. A., "we have lost track of the principles and aims of education." Among the speakers on the subject, all of national reputation, will be William L. Bryan, president Indiana university, Bloomington, Ind.; Nathan G. Schaeffer, state superintendent of public instruction, Harrisburg, Pa.; Alexander Melkkojohn, president Amherst college, Amherst, Mass., and Theodore Robinson, Chicago.
