DISTRIBUTERS QUIT THE SALE OF POTATOES

NORTH PACIFIC ASSOCIATION GOES OUT OF THE SPUD BUSINESS

Spokane, May 5.—Because of the prospect of an enormous increase in the fruit tonnage of the northwest and a concurrently large increase in the number of affiliated growers' associations, the North Pacific Fruit Distributors today formally announced that it would wind up its southern Idaho potato business by May 1. This action was taken in such a way as to be agreeable to the potato growers. The continuance of all of last season's affiliations and the addition of new local associations this season give the big central selling agency almost absolute domination of the fruit market this year. Such control should operate to increase the benefit of the distributors to the growers, and the organization's machinery will thus be left free to make the most of this advantage.

In view of this situation the distributors took the initiative in proposing a separation between itself and the Southern Idaho Producers' association, suggesting the continuance of the latter as a separate organization with headquarters in the center of the potato growing district at Pocatello, Idaho.

"The distributors' trustees believed that the southern Idaho potato growers should be given the privilege of electing whether they preferred to build a separate organization for the exclusive use of their own separate industry," said General Manager J. H. Robbins of the distributors today. "Although the withdrawal period had passed, we proposed to release them, provided it was understood that the action was voluntary on the part of the distributors. The Southern Idaho Producers' board accepted this proposition, passing a resolution of appreciation of the distributors' work in pioneering the field and giving the distributors full credit for placing the southern Idaho potato growers on their present effective, operating basis."

When the potato shipments are ended within the next few weeks, an itemized statement of all transactions will be rendered the growers, this being the policy of the distributors in its fruit operations as well. The decision to cease handling potatoes has no bearing whatever on the fruit operations in southern Idaho, where a substantial increase in both tonnage and local affiliations is promised.
