DAMAGE IS SLIGHT FROM EARLY FROSTS

NORTHWEST FRUITGROWERS REPORT NEGLIGIBLE INJURY IN APRIL.

Spokane, May 7.—Frequent frosts throughout practically all sections of the northwest have threatened the fruit trees for the past two weeks, but, although individual growers in certain parts of the different districts have suffered some loss, the damage generally has been negligible, according to reports that have been received here to date. It appears, in fact, that most sections will have enormous crops, especially of apples. Soft fruits were not affected, but in many instances the result was a mere thinning of blossoms. Despite several frosty nights between April 20 and April 30, the Yakima valley has accounted for little injury, except in individual cases in the lowlands. Strawberries in the extreme eastern end were affected but not to serious extent. The Wapateche and north central Washington district was untouched except for a slight hurt to cherries, although several orchards were quite cold. Below Walla Walla along the Washington-Oregon state line cherries again were hit, and in the north end of the district in some unfavorably situated orchards other soft fruits, as well, showed evidences of frost bite, while the apple crop of a few orchards also was materially cut. In the Spokane and northeastern section no damage at all to apples has been reported; sweet cherries and peaches, of which there is only a small acreage anyway, were killed, but late cherries and pears escaped. In the Garfield district in eastern Washington some effect was noted and in northern Idaho, it is stated, the early frost some time ago dealt cherries a severe blow. Almost imperceptible damage has been reported by Hood river so far, except on the earlier strawberry tracts which were in bloom. After the April 29 frost, it was said that the prune crop in western Washington would be rather irregular. Word has been received that a heavy frost in southern Idaho in the Boise and Payette districts April 24 injured peaches, pears, young prunes and early apples to some extent but that the older prunes and later apples were practically unaffected. Frost, it is reported, visited eastern Oregon April 29, but no information regarding the result has been received yet. Cherries in the Bitter Root valley in Montana were dealt a hard blow several weeks ago; any subsequent injuries have not been ascertained. Apparently the apple crop everywhere in the northwest will be above normal. Although some losses are recorded evidence of increased production generally far more than offset them. Frosts occurred quite generally throughout the northwest April 28 and 29, but it is believed that the danger is now passed.
