

**JURY IS COMPLETED FOR BECKER TRIAL**

**SENSATION IS SPRUNG IN CONNECTION WITH COUNSEL FOR THE DEFENSE.**

New York, May 8.—The jury which will determine whether Charles Becker, the former police lieutenant and head of the "strong arm" squad, plotted the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, was completed late today. Adjournment was promptly taken until 10:30 o'clock tomorrow, when District Attorney Whitman will address the jury, charging that Becker was the "brains" of the conspiracy. The jury is as follows:

F. Meredith Blagden (foreman), 28 years old, bond merchant; James M. Faust, 28, real estate dealer; Thomas W. Edwards, 30, chemist; Edward T. Van Eman, 45, dry goods salesman; Paul D. Cifers, 36, bond salesman; Robert Baxter, 30, clerk; D. L. Holbrook, 48, marine engineer; Phillip Lott, 38, civil engineer; Welter Goodyear, 54, book publisher; Gilbert Shaul, 32, manufacturer; Ephraim Plummer, 68, retired salesman; Wilbur F. Rawlins, 35, salesman.

After 121 talesmen had been examined during today's sessions, the jury was completed shortly before 4 o'clock, when Shaul took the 12th seat in the box.

After his selection, however, Justice Seabury called District Attorney Whitman and Martin T. Manton of Becker's counsel, into his chambers. Just what took place during the conference was not revealed, but when the district attorney and Manton emerged, jurors selected as numbers five and eight, A. V. Farley and W. R. Smith, were called in.

Soon after, Justice Seabury returned to the bench and announced that the two jurors had been excused upon their own application. No reflection, the court said, was to be cast upon each of the men. The work of examining talesmen was again resumed and the jury was taken to a hotel to spend the night.

No mention was made during the day of the reported move to have W. Bourke Cockran of counsel for Becker, adjudged guilty of contempt of court for a remark attributed to him. He had been quoted in the newspaper as saying:

"This is not a trial; it is an assassination."

Several affidavits from newspapermen who swore they heard Cockran say this, were in the hands of the district attorney. It was intimated at the district attorney's office to-night, however, that the affidavits, which were collected at the direction of Justice Seabury, would be presented to the court in the morning. Cockran has not been in court since he made the alleged remark. He added at the time that he was "through with the case," it is said.

The first witness on the stand tomorrow probably will be William J. Fife, a policeman who was at the Metropole hotel at the time Rosenthal was shot.

**STATE TREASURER RAE IS BUSY IN POLITICS**

Helena, May 8.—(Special.)—Aspirants for places on the democratic state ticket this fall will shortly receive letters from W. C. Rae, state treasurer and secretary of the democratic state central committee, advising them they will be expected to circulate their initiative petitions in their own counties, but that the state committee will attend to their circulation in other counties, the candidates to stand the expense pro rata. As soon as Chairman T. M. Swindler appoints the sub-committee, authorized at the recent meeting in Helena to look after the circulation of petitions, Secretary Rae will write the democrats who have announced their candidacy.

**PROMINENT CITIZEN CHARGED WITH FRAUD**

Katispell, May 8.—(Special.)—John E. Lewis of Columbia Falls was arrested this afternoon on a warrant alleging a false statement to obtain bounty claims. Sheriff Ingraham served the paper as Lewis got off a train, returning from a trip to Chicago. This arrest has caused the greatest sensation of all the fraudulent bounty cases. Lewis has extensive holdings in Glacier national park and northwest Montana estimated at half a million. John Smith has pleaded guilty to the charge of making a false statement and will be sentenced tomorrow. The five others will come to preliminary hearing on the postponed date of May 18.

**RESTORED.**

Washington, May 8.—The senate territories committee today ordered a favorable report on a bill restoring to the public domain the Chugach national forest in Alaska. There are 18,000,000 acres in the forest, created several years ago by presidential order. The bill would not affect lands withdrawn for the conservation of coal. Hearings on the Alaska railroad bill, members of the committee say, developed that the timber in the Chugach forest is not merchantable.
