

Bozeman's Valiant Athletes Will Have Their Hands Full This Week

MINERS WILL SEND VALIANT ARRAY TO MEET

RE-ENTRANCE OF GOLD-DIGGERS WON'T BE ANY HALF-HEARTED AFFAIR.

PAT SHEEDY WITH THEM

Former Varsity Pole Vaulters Will Be Member of Squad—"We Will Beat the Aggies," He Says—On Showing of Miners Meet May Depend.

Butte, May 9.—(Special)—The Montana State School of Mines will send a track team to Missoula this year to compete in the interscholastic athletic contests in that city this week. This is the first time the mining school has entered the contests for the past three years, and the engineers expect to give a good account of themselves. During the past few seasons the school of mines has been handicapped in the way of athletics, but in the future the institution intends to turn out some first-class athletes.

Those entered from the school of mines are: Earl Lyford, Walter Simons, J. W. Sheedy, R. J. Cole, Frank Neelon, John Norton, Herman Freshman, Thomas Collins, John Berry, John Bennetts, Frank McPherson, Sam Spiegel, Joseph Lydon, Tom Driscoll and George Vivian.

The Entries.

The boys will leave on the evening of May 11 for Missoula in charge of Coach Jim Greenwood. A number of the boys and some of the professors will accompany them. Situation Ticklish.

Seldom in the history of interscholastic athletics in this state has a more ticklish situation presented itself than exists in the coming triangular games. Three years ago when the Miners withdrew from the meet they gave the Aggies the only victory that has honored the barren canyon across the divide in a good many years. The meet that year was close and went to the Aggies because of the absence of Red of the Miners, sure winner of the hurdle events. This year the return of the gold-diggers may again complicate matters. The varsity and the Aggies are represented by unusually strong teams. The true strength of the university was shown in the meet with Washington State, the games in Idaho constituting a mystery which is hard to solve. Comparison of scores gives the varsity an edge over the Aggies, but no team composed of substitutes such as Jolley, Gattton, Ingram, Schrmacher and Kenck is going to be easy meat. Should the inroads of the Miners affect the varsity totals, a victory by the Aggies would be very possible. It all depends upon how the score of the gold-diggers affects the totals of the other squads.

That the Miners have a strong team is admitted by all students of the situation. Pat Sheedy, a former Montana athlete, is a member of the Miners' team and is certain to win points in the pole vault if not in other events. Lyford, Freshman, McPherson, Lydon and Driscoll of the Miners' team are old Butte high school men, whose records are well known. That they will be able to win points goes without saying.

Sheedy was in Missoula at the time of the Washington-Montana meet, and spoke enthusiastically of the team at that time. "We will beat the Aggies," he said then. The lineup of the team seems to indicate that the Miners will be strong, whether they can beat the Farmers or not.

List of Entries Complete for Interscholastic Meet

University Committee Makes Final Arrangements for Games to Be Held on Campus Next Thursday and Friday Afternoons—Program Is Changed.

The committee in charge of the University of Montana's eleventh annual interscholastic meet has completed the preliminary arrangements and is now ready for the greater task of entertaining and superintending the contests of the largest crowd of high school boys and girls that ever took part in any single event in Montana. Two hundred and forty-three men are entered for the athletic events alone, a splendid increase over all former figures. Several new schools are to be represented and many of the old contestants have increased the size of their teams.

The list of entries was complete yesterday. It includes the names of many familiar stars, most notable among them being Phelps, the colored sprinter from Butte, who is expected to sweep the field this spring.

Old Stars Many.

The known performers who will participate in the meet this year are many. Phelps of Butte, winner last year of the 100, and the 50-yard dash and of third place in the 220-yard dash is bringing a strong team from Butte. DeVore of Gallatin, almost the only remaining member of the team that dominated the meet for four years, is coming again. DeVore won first place in the discus hurl last year and is entered this spring in all of the weight events. Kelly of Anaconda, who won the 220-yard low hurdles and took third place in the pole vault last year, will be back again with a strong team behind him. Newman of Helena, who won the 220-yard low hurdles last year will be here. These are the only first-place winners who are coming back. Other point-winners in last year's games who will be participants this year are: Bridgeman of Great Falls, winner of second place in the mile; Sticht of Missoula, winner of third place in the mile; Puyeur of Victor, winner of third place in the shot put; Howard of Gallatin, who tied for first place in the high jump; Watkins of Great Falls, who took third in the 50-yard dash; Kemp of Missoula, winner of third place in the half mile; Murphy of Missoula, winner of second place in the 100-yard dash; Gillette of Great Falls, winner of second place in the 400-yard dash; McAuliffe of Butte, winner of second place in the pole vault, and Anderson of Anaconda, winner of third place in the broad jump and of third place in the high jump.

Old Heroes Missing.

Many familiar faces will be missing on the field this year. Ingram of Helena, who won the mile run and took second in the half mile will not be here. Britain of Gallatin, winner of the shot put, has graduated. Larimer of Billings, who won the hammer throw and took third place in the discus hurl will not be back. Gattton of Gallatin, who tied for first place in the high jump, has graduated. Jolley of Gallatin, sharer of individual honors last year, is now a college athlete. Jones of Missoula, winner of the half and the quarter mile races, and Prescott, his teammate, who won the pole vault, are not in Missoula's team. Kress of Sweetgrass, who won the high hurdles and the broad jump, is no longer in high school.

Most of these old stars will take part in the interscholastic meet Wednesday afternoon, however. Ingram, Britain, Gattton and Jolley will be members of the team the state agricultural college is to send here to participate in the state triangular games, while Jones and Prescott will wear the colors of the university.

On account of the large number of entries this year the university committee has been forced to revise the program of events. It will be necessary this year to have trial heats in the 880-yard run and in the relay race, and to permit this, changes in the arrangement of the program have been made necessary.

ON THEIR CHANCES GALLATIN MEN FIGURE

FOUR-TIME WINNERS OF INTER-SCHOLASTIC MEET WILL HAVE STRONG TEAM.

MANY OLD WINNERS GONE

Jolley, Brittain, Gattton and Taylor, Who Won 26 of Gallatin's 38 Points Last Year, Are Not on Squad This Spring.

Bozeman, May 8.—(Special)—Duplicators for the state high school track meet who are ignoring the Gallatin county high school in their calculations will have to revise their figures after the smoke and dust of the meet have blown over, local fans declare. The Gallatin team has won the state meet for four consecutive years, and Coach Gilson is taking 10 men down to Missoula this spring who are believed at home to have a good chance to figure with the best of the point winners.

Curt Howard, who is expected to do Gallatin's heavy work, is entered in nine events, and it is believed that he has a chance for points in several of them. He will compete in both hurdle races, the half mile relay, the shot put, the hammer and discus throws, the high jump, pole vault and broad jump. The Gallatin team will be composed of Kelly, Starrow, Dineen, Gattton, DeVore, Coffey, Howard, Jolley, Luce, Oberly, Park, Roberts, Tope!, Westlake and Stotesbury. Three of these men are on the debating team which will meet Miles City for the state championship.

Team Greatly Weakened.

On the university campus, which grows two or three experts to the square yard, Gallatin is figured as among the most prominent contenders for the state championship, though ranked below Butte and Missoula. Last year Gallatin's athletes won a total of 38 points in the meet. Losses by graduation have more than cut this total in two. Jolley, Brittain, Gattton and Taylor, all of whom graduated last spring, won 26 points in the meet last year. This spring the boys from Gallatin will have as the nucleus of their team men who won a total of 12 points last year, which puts them, on paper, ahead of all teams except Butte, which has men who won last year 14 points.

Cooper is Champion.

Lyle Cooper of Hamilton won the individual championship with a total of 20 points for his team. This athlete showed wonderful form in the dashes. He entered four events, the 50 and 100-yard dashes, the 220-yard dash and hurdles and the 220-yard dash, and won first easily in each. Puyeur of Victor and McLeod of Corvallis each scored 13 points for their schools. Cowan of Victor scored 12 points.

Hamilton Wins Relay.

The relay race was one of the prettiest events of the day, the Hamilton team winning easily. Clark Gray gave his teammates a good lead on the first lap, Voigt, Dulan and Cooper keeping the lead. Stevensville took second and Corvallis third in this race.

WASHINGTON STATE LOSES TO IDAHO IN CLOSE MEET

By Score of 69 to 62 Moscow Team Wins From Ancient Rival—Yale Has No Trouble in Defeating Princeton and Cornell Wins Decisive Victory Over Harvard—Illinois Beats Wisconsin Badly—Other Scores.

Fullman, Wash., May 9.—The University of Idaho won the dual track meet here this afternoon from Washington State university by a score of 69 to 62. The meet was not decided until Idaho forged ahead in the javelin throw and broad jump and clinched it with the relay. Crane made a new state college record of six feet in the high jump. Yale Has Busy Time.

New Haven, Conn., May 9.—Yale won the annual track meet with Princeton on Yale field today with unexpected ease, 87 2-5 to 16 3-5 points. The blue athletes literally swept the track and field, taking 12 first places, while the orange and black took only one. The blue won every point in the hammer throw, broad jump, high jump, 220-yard hurdles and 100-yard dash. One of the surprises of the meet was the one-mile run, which was won by McKenzie of Princeton. Poucher, who broke the Yale record in the event, was generally counted upon to win, but he made a poor showing and was unable to overcome McKenzie's lead.

Fast Quarter Feature.

Ithaca, N. Y., May 9.—One of the greatest track victories that a Cornell team has ever achieved on Percy field was witnessed today when Coach Monkley's men decisively triumphed over Harvard by 75 2-5 to 41 3-5. Cornell won eight firsts, while the crimson took four. Ringham of Harvard hung up a new local track record in the quarter mile with time of 48 4-5 seconds. He beat Caldwell of Cornell by an inch. After leading in the 220-yard dash, Van Winkle of Cornell fell and Barron of Harvard won. The pole vault was a brilliant exhibition, Milton and Pruitt, both of Cornell, tying for first place at 12 feet, 4 1/2 inches.

Three Cornell men and two Harvard men tied for first place in the high jump at 5 feet 8 1/2 inches and divided the points.

Lippincott Hurt.

Philadelphia, May 9.—The University of Pennsylvania track team defeated Dartmouth today in their annual meet by 67 1/2 to 49 1/2, but Pennsylvania paid the heaviest of penalties because Donald Lippincott, the inter-collegiate 220-yard champion and sharer in the world's record, was seriously hurt. He was leading the field at the 75-yard mark in the 100-yard dash when he suddenly faltered and staggered to one side of the track. He was carried to the gymnasium, where it was found he had sprained a tendon. The accident probably will keep Lippincott out of the intercollegiate.

Wisconsin Beaten.

Madison, Wis., May 9.—University of Illinois athletes won track and field honors in a dual meet with Wisconsin here today, scoring 76 1/2 points to 49 1/2 for Wisconsin.

Victor High School Wins Big Ravalli County Meet

In One of the Closest Meets in the History of the Association, Home Team Wins—Hamilton Man Is Individual Champion and Helps Win Relay.

Victor, May 9.—(Special)—Not until the last event of the day had been decided was it certain the Victor high school track team had won the fourth annual meet of the Ravalli County Athletic association, held here today. Despite the fact that the home team went into the finals today with 17 points won in the three events held yesterday, Stevensville and Hamilton narrowed the gaps and nearly won the meet.

At the close of the meet, Victor led the field with a total of 42 points, Hamilton standing second with 35 and Stevensville third with 32. Corvallis, though not a dangerous contender for first honors, made a good showing and of the end had accumulated a total of 17. A most exciting finish has never been seen in a county meet. Victor's all-around strength won the meet. Not dependent upon the performances of any one star, the home team gathered in seconds and thirds in almost every event. To this the victory may be attributed.

Eight New Records.

Eight records out of 14 were broken today, an unusual thing for any meet. Cherry of Stevensville made the most remarkable performance, throwing the hammer 137 feet, 7 inches, more than 30 feet beyond the former mark of 106 feet, 9 inches. The state record, held by Davis of Park county is less than a foot better than this, 138 feet, 2 1/4 inches. Inasmuch as the event was won last year with a throw of 128 feet, Cherry is a likely contender for honors in the state meet at the state university next week.

Gray of Hamilton broad jumped 19 feet, 8 1-4 inches this afternoon, breaking Dowd's record by two inches. The record in the high jump was raised two inches, Babbitt leaping 5 feet, 4 inches today. The former record of 52 feet for the discus was raised to 59 feet, 5 inches by McLeod of Corvallis. Dowling of Stevensville clipped 30 seconds off the record for the mile run, covering the course in 5:09. Anderson of Stevensville ran the 440 in :56, two seconds faster than the record. The pole vault and the shot put records were broken yesterday.
